Beloved Community,

The Bible opens in a garden, and on Ash Wednesday we recalled the expulsion of Adam and Eve from that garden. On Easter Sunday, we return to the garden having come full circle. The image of the garden appeals to me especially this year as I stare out the window at the frozen grimy piles of snow that cover the gardens around my home. That Easter is upon us and the snow shows no sign of melting, reminds me of the words from the T.S. Eliot's poem *Wasteland*, "April is the cruelest month." Though I know he was not referring to Aprils in Maine, the words seem apt to me. Easter, however, is not a meteorological event; it is not contingent on the weather. It arrives regardless of the greening, or *not* greening, of the spring.

This April, the month is bookended by two important Sundays: Easter on April 1st and my final service on April 29th. As this is my last Steeplenotes letter, I am feeling a need to reflect on both. In casting about for a possible thread to draw these two Sundays together, I found myself going back to the first Sunday I preached at FCC, in June 2009. It was my candidating sermon and I used the above Isaiah text for a sermon titled "Brown into Green." In it I suggested that one way to understand the biblical narrative was as the story of a people in partnership with God turning brown into green. In much of the Hebrew scriptures the image of the watered and lush oasis or garden was the metaphor for God's promise of restoration and life. I suggested that the work of the church was to do much the same - To offer life in a world that at times seems brown and desolate, much like a garden in need of water.

That the resurrection happens in a garden is entirely appropriate, the antithesis of the hard, rocky hill of Golgotha, (the place of the skull, as it is translated). The Resurrection may be the ultimate example of God turning a hard, unforgiving fact such as death into the green of new life and hope.

Some of us view the whole story with skepticism. We are unsure what to do with it, but whether the

resurrection is or is not factual, *it is true*. It's the deepest and truest of all mysteries because lives that were shattered and lost have been reclaimed and made whole in the light of that mystery. Just ask Mary Magdalene who went from deep grief to hope and to joy. Just ask Peter the denying deserter who became the rock. Just ask Saul the persecutor who became Paul the Apostle. Look at your own lives and recall the moments of crucifixion that were redeemed by the moments of resurrection, when life bloomed in the hard ground of human experience, when green overcame the barren brownness of despair.

As I think ahead to the 29th, I am filled with both sadness and joy. Many of you are experiencing similar emotions. As we move forward, I remind you (and myself) that we are Easter people, we are people of that garden. Both corporately and as individuals, our very lives embody the possibility of resurrection, the promise of the garden with its breadth of life. Over the last nine years, we have experienced the cycles of the garden, of life and death, and, to quote the poet, Wendall Berry, we have "practiced resurrection," and come out the other side a stronger community hopeful for the future and committed to the journey. We have turned brown into green on more than one occasion.

What ever happens, *All shall be well, all shall be well, all manner of things shall be well.*

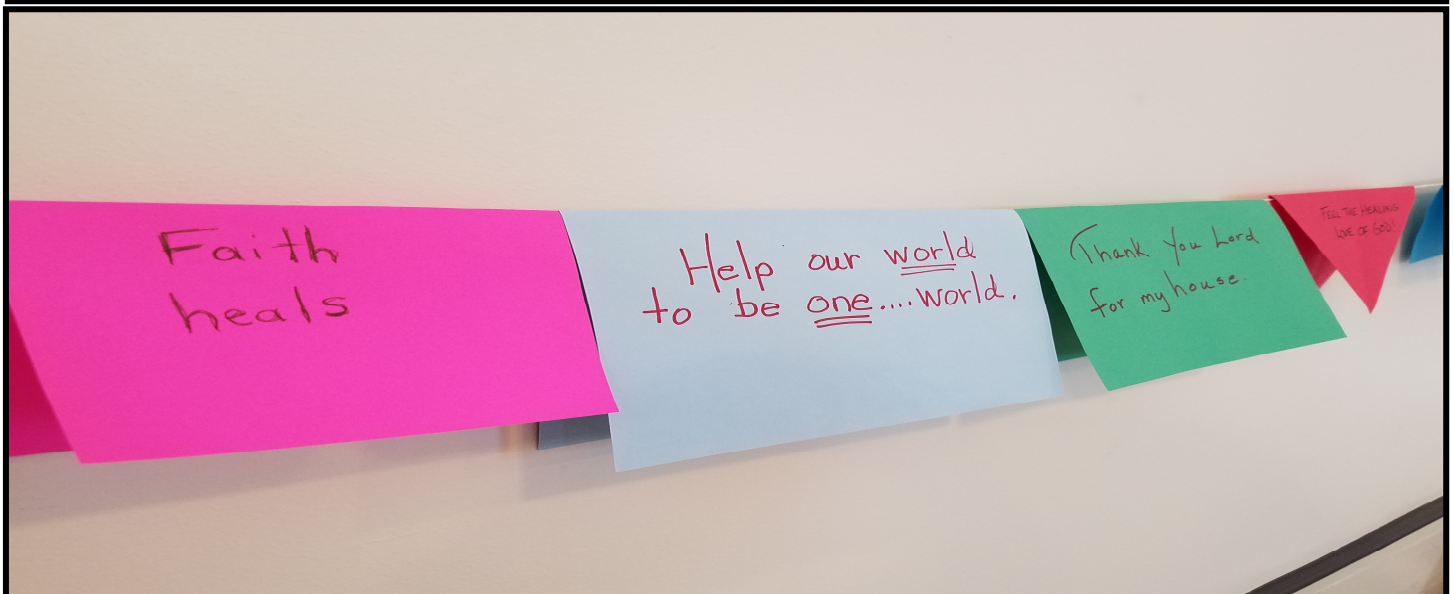


2018 Lenten Season Encourages Members and Friends to Share

Falmouth's Hembre wins Travis Roy Award

LEWISTON — Theo Hembre was a confident player from one end of the ice to the other, and that confidence was still there Sunday while giving a speech as one of four finalists for the Travis Roy Award. What he wasn't sure about was whether or not he would win the award. As it turned out, the Falmouth High forward was chosen over three defensemen as the 23rd winner of the award, presented by the Maine Class A High School Hockey Coaches Association and given to the top Class A senior boys' hockey player. The other finalists were Ryan Bossie of Lewiston, Mike Hatch of Cheverus and Cam King of Portland/Deering.

"I know all three guys were amazing hockey players," Hembre said. "We all had an equal chance to get it, and I was just thrilled to get it."

Hembre led Class A with 46 points during the regular season – 27 goals and 19 assists – and added an assist in Falmouth's lone playoff game. He said during his speech that a public speaking class earlier this school year gave him confidence as he stood in front of the banquet attendees at the Ramada Inn. He certainly stood out from the crowd during his career.

"I think it was a tough pick. The vote was probably the tightest it's been since I've been here," Falmouth Coach Deron Barton said. "(There were) lot of other really, really deserving, good hockey players. Theo, I think he's a prolific player, he's a prolific scorer. And I think a lot of it has to do with, too, he performed his best against the best competition. He performed his best against the toughest teams. So I think that's probably one of the things that just set him apart, maybe, if anything, was that."

Hembre is the third winner from Falmouth, following Peter Gustavson in 2005 and Isac Nordstrom in 2015. Hembre was a freshman when Nordstrom won the award. "I just learned that he was a hard worker, he was a good captain. I was only there for a year when he was there, so I just was able to see what he was doing," Hembre said.

Barton said Hembre might have learned the commitment to playing in the defensive end – a key part of

Falmouth's system – from Nordstrom. "We have a saying that, 'We don't know why, but the better you play in your own end the more scoring opportunities you get,' and I think he benefited from that the most," Barton said.

Hembre said the key to succeeding against players like Bossie, Hatch and King was to avoid them whenever possible. That often meant good things for the Yachtsmen, who went 5-1 against the other finalists' teams, with Hembre amassing 17 points (nine goals, eight assists).

In one of the lighter moments of Hembre's speech, he said to his dad, "I'm sorry for all the broken sticks." But Hembre said with the metal and wood trophy in his hands, that they were definitely worth it.

Theo confirmed his faith here at Foreside in May of 2015 and joins his parents Jill and David in membership at FCC.
