#### **Notes from Reverend Geoff Parker**

We're entering the season in which *thanks* comes to the forefront of a lot of minds, as we get ready for our favorite feast themed national holiday... which is, actually at this point, a *holy day* for many of our churches. This is a full circle from the practices of fasting and feasting of our puritan ancestors, to celebrations after the Revolutionary and Civil Wars, to presidential proclamations all the way home to church.

I hope that I, and we, say thanks often—not just in November. Partly because the reasons and history behind the Thanksgiving holiday have always been a little suspect, even the sanitized version we learned in grade school with the paper hats and all. Partly, because Jesus calls us to live with gratitude for the gifts of life we receive. But also because I believe we need thanksgiving, or the spiritual practice I like to lift out of it: gratitude.

Saying "thank you," can feel very rote... and I actually think it's good to work on making it that way. Often, saying it can lead to *feeling it*, and grounding ourselves in the practice of giving thanks can actually open up moments and realizations of gratitude.

There are many very boring, ordinary ways in which we give and receive on a daily basis, and some so grand we don't really perceive them. Not least, if you are reading this, we continue to receive the gift of life itself, and the strange, beautiful, and oftentimes challenging experience of being a human person.

So, if you haven't heard it recently, *thank you* for all you do as the members of the body of Christ here in our congregation. The ways you share—your lives, your gifts, your passion and energy—with one another and with our community make *me* profoundly grateful on an almost daily basis.

I don't think we need the reminder of gratitude as some sort of "feel good" program that might numb the world around us. I *do think* we need to practice this gratitude because it gives us a sense of connection and resilience that allows

us to face up to the challenges of our world and our lives.

In her most recent book, *Grateful*, the theologian and writer Diana Butler Bass lifts up the connecting work of gratitude as a practice:

Strange thing about gratitude—it always comes with a preposition. We are grateful for something, grateful to someone, and, often, grateful with others. Even in untargeted gratitude and when you are completely alone, prepositions show up... When it comes to gratitude, "me" always leads to "we." "Gratitude takes us outside ourselves," insists Robert Emmons, "where we see ourselves as part of a larger, intricate network of sustaining relationships, relationships that are mutually reciprocal."  $\frac{1}{2}$ 

This month, we give thanks for saints who have helped call us to life on All Saints Day, we give thanks for the saints gathered right here and now as we welcome new members on November 10, and we will give thanks for the gifts of our lives in blessing our annual pledges to our common life. All these and more speak to the ways in which gratitude undergirds and weaves our lives together.

Through all the busy-ness of this season, I hope that you will take the time to give thanks to and for one another, and to God for the wonders great and small, and let that gratitude transform our giving and sharing in the world.

#### The Fruit We All Share

The fruit – It's up there, with God. It's out there, among you. And it's in here, in my heart.

I can blame it all on Polly Burke. Right, Polly? I started coming here 42 years ago when my then wife and I wanted our daughter to be baptized. Polly suggested we go see Don Hodson up at the Foreside Community Church. He suggested we come to a few services before we did the baptism.

We were hooked within two services. For a while, I literally felt pain in my chest. Your love was that strong, and I had been missing something.

Over the years, I have contributed, I believe generously, of my time, talent, and treasure. Regardless of what I have given, I have received much more.

An anecdote: Susan and I separated and moved toward divorce in 1987. Despite all sorts of differences, there were two things we agreed on: 1) We would not use our children as weapons. 2) We would both continue our membership here.

To effect the latter, we literally asked this congregation not to take sides, but give us both support. You did.

A few years later, I believe 1992, during the joys, Susan raised her hand to announce that she and Craig Perron had gotten engaged during the prior week. I then raised my hand and announced that Phyllis Hewitt had also gotten engaged.

You laughed. We laughed. Thank you.

Another piece of fruit created and shared here, I believe it was the summer of 1987, one of you and I had a conversation on the outside steps. We were discussing whether or not I was an alcoholic. That one of you told me that he/she could not tell me whether or not. That was just what I needed to chew on for a few months; the result: I have not had a drink for 32 years.

Recently, I have been trying to reduce the amount of time I devote here. I have had some success, and I have more to do.

We talk of time, talent and treasure. I believe my talent is on the decline. I have always had trouble remembering names. Now, I am increasingly having trouble remembering words. As background, my grandmother, mother and sister all died with Alzheimer's disease. My sense is that I am heading in that direction.

So, I ask all of you to pray for me and to accept whomever I become. I appeal to each of you to review how you support our church and its congregants.

And just because it is pledge season, please take a second look at your pledge support. By that, I mean your treasure.




# 2020 Pledge Drive Up



# FCC Book Club Updates

On an icy winter night of 1981 in the rustic community of Reddington, Vermont, seasoned midwife Sibyl Danforth is forced to make a life-or-death decision that will change her world forever. Trapped by the weather in an isolated farmhouse, cut off from the hospital or even the emergency squad, she takes desperate measures to save the life of a baby, performing a cesarean section on a woman she believes has died of a stroke during a long and painful labor. But what if the woman was still alive during the surgery? What if Sibyl herself inadvertently killed her? The hair-raising story of Charlotte Bedford's death and of the subsequent trial of Sibyl Danforth is hauntingly told by Sibyl's fourteen-year-old daughter Connie, now an obstetrician. She is remembering, and it is through her intelligent and watchful eyes that we witness the tragic effects of Charlotte's death and Sibyl's trial. And as Sibyl



faces the antagonism of the law, the hostility of the medical establishment, and the nagging accusations of her own conscience, we are compelled to confront questions of human responsibility that are fundamental to our society. As with all of the very best novels, *Midwives* provides no easy answers; rather, it consistently engages, moves, and challenges our ways of thinking.


