Notes from Reverend Geoff Parker

Silent Day

As we move through the days of Christmas, and into the New Year... I find it can sometimes be a dramatic change of gears.

Have you ever noticed that a lot of the activity and sounds leading up to that magical singing of *Silent Night* on Christmas Eve are anything but silent? That the celebrations often just get a little louder afterwards?

When I was younger, and participated in celebrations of the New Year in different ways, I found a holiday just of my own: I remember the quiet and the joy I found walking the streets of New York City on New Year's **Day**...let's just say a holiday that that city does not celebrate as much as New Year's Eve. For me, there was something magical in walking about in a world that had so recently been so loud, but now slept silently, even in the shining sun.

We have our versions of this quiet tradition here in Maine. Recently, as we went through our first snow accumulations of the year, I saw a lot of people talking about the science behind the quiet after a snowfall. It turns out, one of the reasons why those snowy hours right after a storm seem so serene is that they are so *quiet*. Even here in Maine, the world around us is filled with sounds of life, of machinery and cars, of people... of even the wind, *all the time*. Snow transports us out of that reality, absorbing almost as much sound as some commercial soundproofing materials, it turns out. It creates a quiet that we do not experience almost any other time.

It turns out that we need times of remove, times of quiet, times transported out of the sounds of life to be inspired by the beauty of life. The writer, teacher, and priest Henri Nouwen says:

Somewhere we know that without silence words lose their meaning, that without listening speaking no longer heals, that without distance closeness cannot cure. [1]

Recently, I read a Q&A for kids about sound. A five-year-old was very excited about what might have been the loudest sound ever, and what it would

be like to hear it. Short answer, it might have been the explosion of Krakatoa in 1883, and it would have been extremely un-fun to hear it... the sound traveled around the world in shockwaves multiple times and could have caused serious injury for anyone too close. In the course of explaining this, the reporter mentioned we are actually pummeled by "sound": the compression and expansion of air in waves all the time. It is a neat feature of evolution that our ears simply do not process much of this noise as sounds that we "hear." If we did, we might never rest!

As we begin a new year together... I give thanks to God for these gifts of creation, in our bodies, in our weather, in our patterns of life... that offer silence that transports us out of the noise of every day to wonder and hear what the scriptures call the *small*, *still*, *voice of God*^[2]. I give thanks for stories of our faith which tell us that cosmic redemption and healing begin as the Christ-child sleeps, and wise ones quietly offer gifts.

I hope, as the light awakens in our days again, that you take some brief moment to pause and wonder at that silence, and where it might be calling you to renew yourself... and where it may call you—and us—to speak new words of hope to friends and strangers this year.




Painting at FCC?


