

#### Notes from Reverend Jim Gertmenian

**Seen last summer on a country road:** a man and his son walking along the shoulder – the boy, eleven, twelve, just a few steps ahead of his dad. Leaves from the same notebook, these faces – written in the same hand and telling an uninterrupted story, yet bearing the clear marks of having been set down on different days and reflective of different moods, different seasons. The boy comes to a small bridge, stops, leans over the railing to watch the water glide away beneath. Now the father is behind him (this is the part I remember most vividly, as if it were I standing there on the bridge), putting a hand on each shoulder, and in a single, effortless movement, he bends over and kisses his son on the top of his head. If the boy responds, it is in neither word nor visible gesture, but in some language reserved for the two of them, a language which I, the outside, can never know.

Reflecting on this now, I think of a line from Willa Cather, in *My Antonia*. Antonia is speaking to Jim Burden, her life-long friend: "Ain't it wonderful, Jim, how much people can mean to each other?"

It is wonderful – even though the boy and the man will not always walk the country road, even though the relationship of parent and child must, to be healthy, include conflict as well as continuity. Even though the day will come when it will be the younger man who leans over his father to leave a kiss, a kiss of parting. Relationships – all kinds of relationships – are fraught with difficulty, even pain, but still . . . it is "wonderful how much people can mean to each other." Don't you agree?

When I moved to Maine a few years ago after retiring from the ministry, it was hard for me to imagine joining a church. For a variety of reasons I just wasn't ready. Perhaps I was still grieving the separation from my last congregation. Perhaps I wasn't sure how to comfortably sit in a pew, when all I had known for forty-plus years was standing in the pulpit. The reasons don't really matter now. What matters is that when I happened to find myself in worship at the Foreside Community Church, the first thing I noticed was how much you all mean to one another. It was palpable, obvious . . . and moving to me. I'm still a newcomer, having just joined the church about a year ago, and there are many of you whom I still want to know. But it feels right – a gift – to be able to share in the life of a congregation where there is such mutual care and where the tender threads of community are so beautifully woven.

I look forward to sharing in the leadership of worship for three Sundays this month while Geoff is on Parental Leave . . . and though I won't be able to "see" you, it gives me joy to know that you will be there.

Dear Friends at Foreside Community Church,



Some members have been asking how we can help care for those who have been impacted by the severe winter weather in the South. The following is from our National United Church of Christ newsroom.

### UCC Issues Appeal in Response to Winter Storms

The United Church of Christ is issuing an appeal to assist people affected by this year's Winter Storms.

The impact of massive and intense storms is being felt across a wide swath of the United States. So far Texas has been particularly hard hit, and the situation there is terrifying.

All counties in Texas have been affected. Snow, freezing temperatures and slick roads have made movement difficult. Power outages, boil water orders, potable water and food shortages, and bursting water pipes as temperatures finally rise are causing widespread havoc.

As the tragedy continues to unfold, a number of UCC congregations are opening up warming centers and distributing emergency food and water. The South Central Conference has reached out to all its churches to inquire about damage and the needs of their ministries.

UCC Disaster Ministries, Global H.O.P.E. Team are working with leaders in the impacted communities. The current and ongoing needs include support for shelter and food, clean-up, and repair.



#### From the Archives

When I was very young I lived on Johnson Road and then in 1920 my imily moved to the Town Landing Road. Every Sunday my parents, Walter hd Effie Nickerson, and my five sisters, Grace, Ruth, Norma, Helen, Lldred and I would walk to church, seldom missing a service no matter hat the weather was.

My mother would bring pencils, paper and molasses cookies to help bep us quiet during the service. And, we were always quiet. Communion as different then because people would come up to the railing in small coups and kneel down. I remember this because I would check out the ples of everyone's shoes. We always sat in the second pew from the ront on the Falmouth side so I had a good view.

I had the same teacher for Sunday School for 17 years (1915-1932). er name was Mrs. Sturdivant and she was wonderful. The times I liked est were when it was warm enough to sit outside on the large front teps for classes. We had to learn Bible verses and at different times eccived small crosses with verses on them. Once I remember having to tand before the congregation and recite the Beatitudes for Brent aylor's father, Capt. Prescott Taylor. He and his wife were wonderful o all of us.

My favorite minister growing up was Merle Conant (1927-1935). He as a very beloved person to us young people. He and his wife Alice ook several of the Sunday School children to Thomas Pond, Raymond for week. Emilie Cram, Bill Ricker and I were the oldest and looked after he younger ones.


When I was a teenager, there was at least eight of us who would wall o church together on Sunday evenings for Epworth League (youth group). here were Men's and Women's Bible classes and church services on Wednes ay evenings as well.

On February 17, 1940 I married William O. Burleigh from Natick, [ass. We were married by John Dunstan in the front room of the parsonag wanted to have Merle Conant but he was in Bangor stuck in the snow. ud very nearly didn't make it up from Mass. At the time one could see he water from the Parsonage front room and I distinctly remember how plue the water looked with the pure white snow.

After that I didn't return to Falmouth until 1952.


