Notes from Pastor Geoff

Being the Church

Happy New Year, Dear Foreside Friends!

In the season of Epiphany, like shepherds and wise ones who glimpsed the new born savior, we strive to share the news of great joy we have found. It invites us to learn the practice of bearing witness in our world and in our lives to God's love and justice.

As I'm writing to you, we are observing what we hope is a brief suspension of worship for two Sundays, hoping we can help our own—and the wider—community slow the current spread of COVID-19, and hoping we can all safely enjoy time with our families. Yet, this is also an act of public witness: of care for the most vulnerable among us, and for the health care workers that will hopefully be receiving needed relief and support in the coming week from national partners.

A few months ago, in response to an act of vandalism against a nearby church with a sign proclaiming Black Lives Matter, a Governing Board conversation sprang up about how our congregation proclaims our belief in God's hope for justice, and how we carry that message to our community and neighbors. It was a good and faithful discussion that started thinking about a sign, but asked deeper questions: about how we discern as a congregation where we are called to raise our collective voice, and how we make sure that our actions and ministry align with that discernment and pronouncements. We noticed that this is a way of sharing our faith that we have varying levels of comfort with—both more and less—as a group.

In the month of Epiphany, then, you will notice that we will be using our sign down on Foreside Road a little differently. Each week, we'll be sharing—both with our neighbors and community, and within our own worship and reflections—a series of calls to "Be the Church" in the world which the United Church of Christ began sharing with congregations a number of years ago.

Be the Church

Embrace Diversity
Reject Racism
Share Earthly and Spiritual Resources
Care for the Poor
Protect the Environment
Enjoy this Life
Love God
Forgive Often (For Lent!)

This is, perhaps, a small spiritual practice; a chance to "try on" more ways in which we hope to share what God

is calling us to as a people, and get more comfortable sharing that call with others. The world, and yes, the church, are changing rapidly, so these calls to witness and action may change, deepen, or develop as well... but that is nothing new. At the founding of the United Church of Christ, the uniting churches proclaimed in the preamble to their new constitution:

[we affirm] the responsibility of the Church in each generation to make this faith its own in reality of worship, in honesty of thought and expression, and in purity of heart before God.

So, as we explore the church we are called to join God's (re)-creation of, I hope that you'll join with us in this practice of listening for Christ's call to us: where we are called to stand with others in solidarity in the hope for justice... where to listen, where to act, and where to speak as one in this unique body of Christ gathered here on the Foreside.

Merry Christmas, and blessings to you in the New Year!


- Review of the 2021 Annual Financial Report

Delivering the gifts was an adventure for all of the volunteer elves! Some of the parents wanted to hide the gifts until Christmas but many others felt it was important for their children to immediately use their new clothes. It was fun watching the 5-year-old girl hug her colorful new shoes. And there was the 11 year old girl who would not take off her new jacket and kept repeating, "I have a coat, I have a coat." May everyone in the congregation think of the joy you have brought to these children.

FCC Responds to Family in Crisis ~ Emergency need calls are often received at the church office or to Dorothy and we work as a team to respond quickly. Just before Thanksgiving, Opportunity Alliance contacted us about a family of five that was in desperate need of everything- winter clothes, bedding, food, furniture, kitchen equipment and more. They were evicted from their apartment because their landlord decided that he wanted to move in. Lacking the funds to pay for storage, they had to abandon everything that did not fit into their car. FCC office sent out a notice of the need and our congregation immediately responded! Thanks to the compassion of many in our community this family received all of the most crucially needed supplies within the week including winter clothes, towels, blankets and more. Additional help was offered, and the family now has many of the basic furniture items they need. It is truly a blessing to know that FCC is always ready to reach out to those in need and that our church family will share so generously.

The park and preserve are an American national treasure that protects portions of the Brooks Range in northern Alaska. The park is the northernmost national park in the United States, situated entirely north of the Arctic Circle. With no roads, no trails, and no established campsites, the park has no set routes in place and visitors may wander at will across 8.4 million acres of superlative natural beauty. There are no established services within the park boundaries and only limited means of communication work effectively to contact anyone for assistance. Cell phones don't work here. If you like wilderness, this is the trip for you. Please do not miss the telling of this amazing adventure."
