#### **Notes from Pastor Geoff**

#### Telling the Story of Holy Week and Easter

Throughout our Lenten reflection series "Retelling Ourselves," the theologian and poet Padraig Ó Tuama has invited us to understand the stories we have received and learned—the stories of own lives, the stories of our families and our people, the stories of our scripture—as being flexible enough to adapt and transform... and hence transform us as we tell them.

So each year around this time we tell the story of the final days of Jesus's life and ministry: his entrance to Jerusalem, his parting words with his disciples, his capture, his death... the painful quiet after, and the great rejoicing when Easter light shows us the truth of resurrection. Each year this story meets us where we are and greets us with new insight. Sometimes we may feel like the disciple Peter who denies Jesus, sometimes we may be Mary Magdalene who recognizes him even through the uncertainty and wonder of resurrection. Sometimes, we most connect with the shining light of Easter morning... sometimes we need to know that God is with us, even in the shadows of a tomb. Above all, we are reminded wherever we may be in these stories... we are not alone, but surrounded by God's loving presence.

In the last month, as we have watched scenes of violence and suffering brought to us in the news of the war in Ukraine and the resulting refugee crisis, the Holy Week story has again been made clear as we try to make sense of tragic stories such as these. Our faith story shows us God so loves us that God has come to touch even the deepest pain... to assure us that we are not alone in it, and in that assurance to transform those painful parts of our story into new life and hope that can sustain us. We need the gifts of this story of God's love and transformation these days. It is a joy to share in those gifts together in beloved community.

Here at church, we find ourselves entering a time of "retelling:" the current reduction in COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations allows us to reclaim some of our most cherished practices of gathering and worshipping around Holy Week, Easter Sunday, and the season of Easter.

The Governing Board has voted to remove the registration requirement and attendance cap on worship. We will continue to monitor events closely, and may continue to make changes to our worship protocols. For now, I want to remind you that we are committed to welcoming and protecting others who may have additional health concerns. In worship, then:

- Windows will remain open.
- Masks will be required when not leading worship.
- We will respect each other's decisions around distance and contact.
- Overflow seating will be available via video feed to Fellowship Hall if at any time folks feel like they need more space.
- We will continue to commit to informing the church office if we or someone in our household tests positive for COVID-19 after attending worship.

I know I am looking forward to seeing more of you and more of the traditions of this time. I also know that I am thankful to again share the story of Holy Week with one another.

On a personal note, I want to thank you all for your continued prayers of support for Julia and me. We are still tenderly and excitedly awaiting the birth of our second daughter, whom we expect sometime around or before May 23rd. I am also thankful for the good and faithful work of leaders and clergy in our congregation to arrange for a time of parental leave for me. Stay tuned for details of that time next month!

Wishing you many blessings as we continue to find ourselves woven into the story of God's redeeming work and Christ's resurrection in the days to come.

#### Holy Week Events

On Palm Sunday, April 10th, as we tell of Jesus's triumphant entrance into Jerusalem, we'll share in the joyful crowds welcoming Jesus, but also how we struggle to make sense and heal from events of great sorrow and trauma like we hear in the story of Jesus's passion and death. In the last two years, many of us have known grief, isolation, and even trauma. How do we engage these difficult stories on the way to mental health and healing? We will be joined by Dr. Jennifer Blanchette (daughter-in-law of our own Dotty Blanchette) for a Mission Moment, and a conversation and Q&A after worship. Jennifer is practicing psychologist in our area, including working with people to heal from trauma.

On Good Friday, April 15th at 7:00 p.m. join us for the service of Tenebrae (or, *Shadows*). In quiet and candlelight we tell the story of Jesus's last day. In the heartbreak of the tomb, we mourn, but also wait for the hope of Easter dawn.

On Easter Sunday, April 17th join us at 6:00 a.m. at the Portland Yacht Club (40 Old Powerhouse Rd. Just off Foreside Road in Falmouth) for our Sunrise Easter Service with Communion. at 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. There are services of Easter rejoicing with choirs in the Sanctuary. at 9:30 a.m. children and families are invited to join us for the return of our *Annual Easter Egg Hunt* just outside the church! After the 10:30 a.m. service we will join together for a time of community celebration with our first Coffee Hour together in two years!

#### A Call for Delegates to the Maine Conference, United Church of Christ

Foreside Community Church is one of over 5,000 United Church of Christ congregations in the United States. While UCC churches are autonomous, they come together as one church to join in faith and action. The organization is divided into geographic Conferences and Associations; we belong to the Cumberland Association within the Maine Conference. Each member church may elect lay delegates to represent that congregation at meetings of the Conference and Association. Foreside Community Church is allowed three delegates based on our size, but Charlie Bernacchio is currently our only representative. If you would like to learn more about the UCC and meet folks from other churches around our state, please consider joining Charlie in this important calling. Here is what is involved:

#### **The Cumberland Association**

- An annual meeting in the fall, held on a Sunday afternoon in a local congregation.
- Usually a spring educational event, sometimes held on a Saturday.
- Ecclesiastical Councils, ordinations, installations: to determine a candidate's fitness for ministry, or to gather and bless the new ministry of a pastor (and church, if installing); usually three per year, held on a Sunday afternoon.

#### **Maine Conference**

- An annual meeting in the fall, followed by a learning event.
- Preliminary meetings before annual meeting to explain the budget and any resolutions

Delegates should expect to meet with Pastor Geoff prior to gatherings of the Conference to help answer any questions they might have leading up to the meeting, and to meet with the FCC Governing Board to report out after annual meetings of the Association and the Conference.

We will elect our delegates for the coming year at our FCC Spring Congregational Meeting on May 15<sup>th</sup>. Please let Deb Gray know if you are interested in serving.




