

Geoff's passion for traveling was planted early by his own parents' family road trips which introduced Geoff to forty of America's fifty states by the time he was 14. So far, he has journeyed to 42 countries and toured every state except Alaska. Geoff wanted to pass along this zest for learning and exploration to his own sons Bryan, now 33, and Barton, 30. Family vacations always involved journeying to new places and still do.

With his son Bryan (who himself spent one year on his own traveling the globe), Geoff climbed the 8,835-foot Mt. Huayna Picchu in the Andes while touring six countries in South America. Other rich memories include meeting Masai tribesmen in Kenya, helping equip schools in Uganda and South Sudan with computers and driving fourteen hours north of the Arctic Circle to Nordkapp in Norway to stand atop the most northern bluff in continental Europe.

Spending most of his childhood in Fort Lauderdale, Florida meant growing up without snow-related adventures or "the inconveniences of winter," Geoff describes. After meeting Betsy at Lynchburg College in Virginia, graduating from George Washington University and later American University with an MBA, Geoff moved to Maine in 1981. He spent the past 26 years at Bath Savings as a commercial lender. The "quiet" Maine bank, founded in 1852, underwent rapid growth during much of his tenure, opening new branches along the coast of Maine every two or three years.

"I sometimes feel my career was like being George in "It's a Wonderful Life," he says with a smile. Geoff was able to oversee loans and expansions for many businesses and organizations including churches, retirement homes,




