Notes from Reverend Geoff Parker

We Wait...

...in keeping with God's promise, we wait for a new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home... - 2 Peter 3:13

Somewhere between 1500–1600 years ago, the church adopted the habit of a season of preparation and fasting before the celebrations and feasts that we now know as Christmas. As the tradition developed, it became the liturgical season of Advent, in which the preparation for the Nativity story mirrors preparation for Christ's *second* coming in the fulfillment of all time. It became a season of expectation... of waiting.

We don't think about that very often, as Advent has partly become overlaid by the de facto season in which we enjoy the twinkle, rejoicing, sounds, smells, and feasts of Christmas all around our lives: in work and school, with friends and family. At least, that's how it *usually* is for us.

Of course, this year, we *are* fasting for Advent, in so many ways: ...we are fasting from parties, from communal feasts, from school holiday concerts, from embraces with neighbors and friends, and from cherished traditions of worship and fellowship here at church.

I don't know about you, but fasting (and, maybe, waiting) was not a practice that I took to naturally in Advent. Growing up, the Advent calendar was more of a foe than a friend... a series of doors that I would have very much liked to open much faster to get to all the richness of Christmas. (And don't think I haven't noticed how many Advent calendars have been adapted recently to provide treats each day, rather than focusing on the practice of waiting!)

Our ancestors have wisdom that they have sent us through the years, though, like a message in a bottle, cracking and unfurling against the hard rocks of our longing. They tell us of their own struggles, and of the Spirit which strengthened them as they continued to wait for Christ's return, the Christmas that would fulfill all Christmases. They tell us of how that practice of waiting drew their attention to where the world and their lives most needed them to serve and to show the love they knew in God's presence. They tell us how the assurance that, "light still shines" gave them strength to proclaim and call for the new heavens and new earth they longed for, too.

Advent is a season of waiting...

...we are waiting to worship together.
...we are waiting to embrace.
...we are waiting to sing together.
...we are waiting for the warm sense of rejoicing we know together in this season each year.

Even more, we are *still* waiting for justice and righteousness to be at home among us:

...still waiting for the blessings of food and shelter to be accessible to all.

...still waiting for a world in which tragedies like this pandemic do not impact the poor and marginalized among us most acutely.

...still waiting for justice to flow through our justice system for all people, especially people of color.

...still waiting for modern day swords to be beat into ploughshares that will feed and nourish instead of destroy.

We are waiting. But we still proclaim the song that angels carried to shepherds, and that stars twinkled in a mathematics of the Spirit to wise ones who studied them in the night. We will have a pageant beamed directly into our homes from our children "reporting from the field." We will still sing songs (maybe louder than we might at church, even!) of God's Glory. We will still hope to gather outside, briefly, on Christmas Eve to share a candle, a prayer, and the good news for all peoples of Christ birth. Stay tuned for how you can join in those celebrations in the weeks to come.

We wait... not because we are paralyzed by fear, or apathetic to the needs of the world, but because our hungering for joy connects us and calls us as a people to be a part of God's response to longing, to hunger, to need. We wait, especially this year, to show God's care and compassion for all people, because while we long for our traditions, our rejoicing, and the glow of this season... we refuse to let that bring pain, grief, and sorrow for others in this time of pandemic. And, we wait because we have

the patience of those with the knowledge that God's promises have already been fulfilled: and that Christ is with us in darkness and in light.

...with hope.
...with peace.
...with joy.
...with love.

May we nurture all these gifts in one another. May you know their blessings. And, in the Christmas is still surely

coming, may you, all you love, and all of us... know the blessings of the Prince of Peace, alive and living in and among us.

From me, our staff, from all of us, I send prayers and wishes for Advent Blessings, and Merry Christmas to us all!

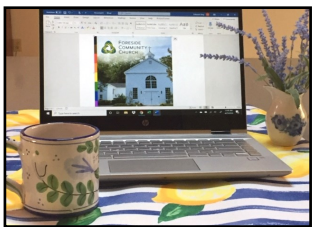

UPDATES, REPORT OUTS, AND UPCOMING EVENTS AT FCC (cont.)



For more than two decades through a program called “*Christmas Angels*” the Foreside Community Church has generously provided Christmas gifts to dozens of needy children. We have worked with a variety of organizations including the Root Cellar, the Family Shelter, and the Maine Youth Center. But for the past several

years all the children who received gifts were from the families who depended on the Falmouth Food Pantry for food assistance. Because all the families from the Pantry are well known by the Pantry managers, the needs and sizes of the children could be personalized and assessed. Unfortunately, the pandemic has caused financial and emotional stress to a wide variety of people and has closed the FCC building and in-person services. Justice & Outreach continues to invite our congregation to help the “angels” in a different way. Starting in October the Pantry parents were contacted to give us information on the size coats needed by their children. J&O kick-started the fund with a donation of \$400 in the name of the congregation. Through weekly updates we invited the congregation to help with this project. Because of your generosity J&O has been able to provide 69 warm winter coats to kids in need. **Because we are still receiving requests for children’s jackets, J&O will continue to welcome donations for coats at this time.**

If you would like to help, please get a check to the Foreside Community Church office with “*Angels*” marked in the memo line. As you consider this request think of Aseel, age 12, who’s need for surgery this year left her parents struggling with new bills. Or Shekinnah, age 9, who is growing like “a weed” but her parents could not buy her a coat because they have both had cuts in work hours and may not be able to stay in their apartment.

As we further work on this version of Christmas Angels it is comforting to remember the generosity and kindness of so many in the church. FCC Youth Profile of the Month

Skye Hayhurst Glover



Skye, a spunky 11-year old member of our church, recently sat down for a Zoom interview with Sunday School Administrator, Laura Rodas. We began by talking about what she would want to share about herself with the church. Pets are clearly a big deal to the Hayhurst Glover family, and Skye shared that she has two pet rats, Cookie and Wonton, who she adores. While the family has 8 pets in all, the rats

are hers and her favorites!

Skye is quite a writer – and quite a reader, too. For her novels, she writes fantasy stories. Skye, her sister, and a friend of theirs are working on a novel where each of the girls writes the narrative of a different character. They then blend the narratives into one story, told from different perspectives. Skye shared that she has written volumes of stories and finds it really satisfying.

The pandemic has not been the easiest situation for Skye as it has made it so she can't spend time with friends as she normally would, playing inside or out on the trampoline in the ways that they used to do before. As tag is a favorite game, that's been hard to not do, too, but she's been focusing her play on dress-up and crafting fantastical stories instead.

Skye is modest and matter-of-fact. Asked about something she could teach someone else, she shared she could teach someone to swim, figure skate, or lots of interesting things about animals. All of this rang true – it turns out that Skye has been on a swim team and has been figure skating since age 5.

The environment is especially important to Skye, and a desire to take care of the planet, animals, and plants runs deep in this family. Skye, Lindy, and a few friends from school are developing a neighborhood club, "Earth's Helpers" focused on helping their community, donating to environmental and social justice causes. In fact, at their next meeting, they are making dolls and small figurines from natural sources (leaves, sticks, bits of logs from the ground, plus string and tape), and will bring these items around the neighborhood (socially distanced) on their wagon, asking for donations and offering the figurines as gifts for donating. They plan to split their raised funds between two causes –protection of the local

Underwood Forrest and also giving to a local BLM group.


When asked to reflect upon what she's good at, Skye shared that she's got a great imagination and is very creative. She also said that her ADHD is one of the best things that has happened to her, as it helps her to be creative and to have out of the box thinking. She is good at just being herself and following her own heart and interests. This ability to just be herself, and not focus on what other people think –to fly with the day, do what you do love, as she described it – clearly guides this charismatic child.

Skye's laissez faire style was exquisitely demonstrated when asked about advice she'd give to parents, generally. She expressed that parents should try to "fly with the day," noting that it can be really stressful for parents to take care of everyone, work from home or in new jobs, to try and get everything done perfectly all the time... so she encouraged parents to go with the flow and not get caught up with unrealistic expectations. For instance, not to worry about making a fancy dinner every night ("it's just one meal, just grab something from the freezer, who really cares?"). This seems like advice worth heeding for many of us in the trenches of having young families.

An incredibly joyful, down-to-earth and thoughtful child, I shared that I thought she had a lot of wisdom for a young person. Having heard this before, she told me how her parents had often said the same thing of her when she was little – that she was always coming up with sage advice and perspective – so much so that her parents even developed a nickname for her as a nod to her "old soul." Asked for parting wisdom, she implored readers to not have a grudge against rats and to try not to get freaked out about them. Not all rats have red eyes (only the white ones do), but even if they do have red eyes, rats are still amazing, smart and kind creatures... they get stereotyped a lot and sometimes mistreated because of that. Skye encourages people to challenge their stereotypes of all kinds, and to try to see the individual or animal, their characteristics and traits and how they are in the world, and not rely on preconceived ideas but instead to have an open mind... One never knows, such open thinking and awareness may lead to becoming a pet rat owner!
