Notes from Reverend Geoff Parker

Dear Foreside Friends,

Writing to you, this last week of October, snow has already fallen here at our house. Thanks be to God, it hasn't quite stuck yet... it was maybe a cosmic warning shot to let me know the leaves are going to get raked up this weekend, or not at all!

We are in that time: of "putting things to bed." I am thankful for the seasons here in Maine which tell us sacred stories in creation through the passage of time, of season, of weather. Trees, birds, creatures of the field... and yes, humans, are preparing ourselves to hunker down to our winter patterns of activity, which is to say... a little less than during the warm months.

This year, that feeling has a wary echo in the current trends and numbers of COVID–19 cases and hospitalizations here in Maine and around the country. Some activities are being called to a close to preserve public health and safety. Some activities and traditions which usually sustain us in the darker and colder times will inevitably be altered to be "closer to home," to honor these commitments to care for ourselves and our neighbors.

In all these things, I hear the invitation to focus our attention, to slow our pace, and to notice more fully the life and gifts around us.

I'll be teaching a class this month, "How to Do (a Holy) Nothing", in which we'll bring the biblical command of Sabbath into conversation with a newer book, *How to Do Nothing* by the artist and professor Jenny Odell. Professor Odell's book asks what I think are important questions about time, about creativity, and most importantly about attention. If you'd like to join us on Wednesday evenings, please email me at gparker@foresidechurch.org.

One of the challenges and gifts of the Sabbath practice is an intentional "hallowing" of time, and of ourselves as creatures who live in time. By doing so, we remind ourselves that our worth, our belovedness, is not based on our activity, but is a free gift of God... and we are invited to withdraw from the anxious busy-ness that drives so much of the world around us.

I know that many of us have our attention drawn to our nation's election next week. It is good and right for that to be true: we should strive to make our deepest held values—showing God's love and care to neighbor, stranger, and creation—real in our public life. Indeed, it is part of how we remind each other that we the beloved... so much more than our "production." I hope that you will join us online for an evening vigil on Monday, November 2nd at 7:00 p.m., as we pray for our nation and each other... that we might discern wisely and fairly as a people.

However, I also want to encourage you to make a holy space in time for yourself, for friends, for loved ones. I pray that you will jealously guard your attention, and be unafraid to withdraw from some of the "economies" of news and social media that can sometimes lead us to feelings of despair. It is good to be informed! It can be less so to be trapped in cycles of activity and attention which feel hopeless. We remember and observe the Sabbath to be reminded of our worth, but also to be revived for those actions and issues which will bring flourishing and justice for our communities and neighbors.

In all we do this month, may we also rest gently in the knowledge that God is with us, and calling to us, still.

Justice and Outreach Updates

Another round of applause for the congregation, who donated nearly 200 items of personal clothing, socks, t shirts, and hair supplies to the **Preble Street Homeless**Teen Center! The items went off in a bin stuffed like Santa's bag to be used as they are needed this winter. And they will be needed.

As the comment above shows, people in our church have continued to reach out to those in need during the pandemic. Throughout the year J&O provides funds to local, national, and international organizations, using the money budgeted for this use.

But another part of the J&O budget is the Good Samaritan Fund, which is available to all church members. If there is a person or specific project you support personally or financially, you can apply for up to \$200 of additional help. Past Good Samaritan projects have ranged from money for a computer, tuition, and rent deposit to supplies for Native Americans. Contact Christina in the office (csklarz@foresidechurch.org or 781-5880) to get a Good Samaritan application; then return it to the church. A member of J&O will then contact to you to discuss the details of your request. Help us to help others in our wider community.

Additional volunteers are still desperately needed to assist with home deliveries for **Falmouth Food Pantry** clients. The pantry is currently serving over 330 families and distribution from the panty's physical location is still not feasible due to the pandemic. If you can possibly free up one day a week, or month, or if your schedule allows you to offer more time, please contact Dotty Blanchette at just as soon as you read this notice. Your involvement will make a huge difference.

He was also in a talent show at the church with a group of men....silly stuff...great turnout and a good fund raiser....it might have been a nice fashion show and then the men getting into ladies old clothes, etc.....good laughs...."






