Notes from Kelli Whitman

Dear Foreside friends,

The crocuses outside my back door bloomed a few days ago. Almost overnight, they went from single green stem blades to blooms of deep purple and golden yellow. The rest of my spring bulbs, the tulips and daffodils, and my single, fragrant hyacinth are all on their way, and I've got my fingers crossed that they might pop by Easter.

But the crocuses always blooms first. Often before I'm ready for spring. Before I realize that the days are indeed growing longer and the soil is warming, and that the cycles of growth and renewal are already at work in places I can't yet perceive.

The crocus blooms first, but it also seems to know that the world is not quite ready to receive it. I love to watch the delicate yellow and purple petals open and close, opening to receive the warm afternoon sun, closing again against the chill of the evening air. Every day I pass by the flowers and they remind me that this season of life and renewal is in a slow process of unfolding and retreating and trying again when the sun is right.

We are entering the liturgical season of Easter. That's right, Easter is in fact an entire season, not a single day. We have 50 days to celebrate the mystery and promise of the resurrection. 50 days to ponder what it means that the tomb is empty and Christ goes ahead of us into the world. This year, I am especially grateful to remember that I have a whole season to welcome the resurrection. Easter, like my crocus, feels as if it has come too early. There's still so much grief and uncertainty in my life and my world – I'm in no mood to shout, "Alleluia."

And yet, the tomb is indeed empty. Christ is loose in the world and beckons us to follow. So, I will lean into a slow unfolding of Easter this year. Like the crocus petals, I'm letting my heart take in moments of joy and mo-

ments of grief, opening and closing to protect and nurture the delicate whispers of hope and renewal that are blooming in the world. I'm giving myself that full 50 days to let the Easter promise take root in me. Christ is risen. He is risen indeed.

It will be my great joy to lead a few worship services during this Easter season. In worship, we'll be celebrating the unfolding season of Easter by reading several stories of Jesus' post-Easter appearances. ESG investing, is a form of sustainable investing that considers an investment's financial returns and its overall impact. An investment's ESG score measures the sustainability of an investment in three specific categories: environmental, social and corporate governance. In other words, does the church want to invest in tobacco? Fossil fuel? Gun manufacture? Does socially responsible investing mean less income? Join us for a lively conversation.
