Dear Foreside Friends,

As we move into the summer, we reach an important time in both our global story of the pandemic, and in our congregation. In the challenges of what has been, we have found gifts of the Spirit here. Those gifts have sustained all of our ministries as we have been apart, and made sure that we are still together as a body of Christ.

Now, we look with joy to "returning home": to the Sanctuary, and to more of our in person worship, and ministries. Like Jacob, we have found ourselves scattered in our *locations*, even if we have remained grounded in the power of the Spirit. Similarly, we have wondered at the presence of the Holy we have seen in all of the faithful service, worship, and sharing we have experienced.

There is joy that we have felt in our first gatherings, excitement at seeing one another, tenderness as long-awaited embraces are shared. There is also grief that we have known as a society, and in our lives here in our church home: injustices revealed, lives lost, experiences of isolation and estrangement for so many. There is the reality that the pandemic is not over for so many in our nation, and in the world.

We hold these twin realities—joy and sorrow—tenderly together... trusting that God will weave them into our lives in ways that bring new life.

On Saturday, June 19th, 18 leaders from our congregation gathered in Fellowship Hall for our annual Leadership Retreat. From Governing Board members, to Ministry leaders, to staff... all came from a sense of commitment to our congregation and its ministry. It was a gift to be together.

We took as our frame for discussion stories of the people of God—and indeed, Jesus—in times of wilderness and wandering, and in times of returning.

We listened for the clarity of gifts that we have received in this time "away": things we have learned, strengths we have developed, sightings of the Holy in beautiful and unexpected moments of community and connection.

We also noted that wilderness can be a time of temptation, as well: indeed, we may be tempted to "return to normal" without carrying the learning of the pandemic with us. We may be tempted to brush aside the hard work of collective healing so many in our community and in the world may need before "moving on."

We will share more, and invite you to share with us, in the fall. For now, I want to invite you into the way of the wandering and wondering Jacob as he lived into God's promise that he would be brought safely *home*.

- First, rest. Our Staff will take a sabbath from July 5th 25th. I'm thankful for the recognition and celebration this time represents for their wonderful work in this year. I would also encourage each of you to take time to renew. The past year has been exhausting to body, mind, and spirit. Sabbath rest is intended to help remind us of our belovedness, not for what we can produce or do, but for who we are within a creation that is very good. Rest, revel in this creation, find joy. Pastor Amelia from Falmouth Congregational Church will be available to provide any emergency pastoral care, and I encourage you to worship with Falmouth Congregational Church as you feel called.
- Next, *reflect*. What have you learned in this time? What strength and skills may have developed? Where have you experienced a pure gift of the Holy in a surprising way? What temptations might draw you or us away from these gifts and visions, and back to "routines" that did not bring life?
- Finally, *recognize*. Jacob blessed and commemorated the place where he felt God's presence. How will you—how will we all—commemorate the year that has been, marking both the learning and growth that has happened, and releasing the pain or sorrow that has also been with us? We owe it to ourselves to make real the lessons and memories of this time and these experiences.

For now, I wish you deep blessings of the Spirit in this quiet season of our lives. I look forward to our continued sightings of the risen Christ in our midst in all the ministry and life together to come, for *surely, the Lord is in this place!*




With Gratitude to Beth, Laura, Geoff and Trevor and David!

Dear wonderful folks at Foreside Community,

Thanks so much for your ongoing kind and generous support of Grace-Street Ministry. As you can imagine, the pandemic has thrown a bunch of wrenches into the delivery of services to the unhoused, although thankfully there have been relatively few infections.

At this point, people are spread out between local motels, the Oxford shelter (at reduced capacity), and various sidewalks, doorways or more remote campsites far from the city center. And since there is no day shelter and libraries are still closed, people are again congregating in Deering Oaks Park, where a sizeable number of people have developed head-to-toe rashes from Brown Tail Moth caterpillars. Yet another challenge for folks living outside.

On a positive note, we've started our Sunday services up again after suspending them for more than a year. That piece of normalcy has been a blessing for all of us.

Again, thanks for letting us bring your love to the streets of Portland.
