Notes from Pastor Geoff

The Manger: Christ Born in Us

O holy Child of Bethlehem, descend to us, we pray; cast out our sin and enter in; be born in us today.

We hear the Christmas angels the great glad tidings tell:

O come to us, abide with us, our Lord Emmanuel!

In the prayers of mystics and in the words of this old carol is one of the deepest hopes of our faith: that God has come to dwell in and with us in human life, and hence, has come to transform it. In Advent, we tell the unlikely story in this season of just that, God being born into life in a vulnerable child, in a manger (a feed trough!), in a stable... we have told the story so many times that sometimes we forget the power of what it symbolizes. So, in this coming season of Advent, we'll be meditating on "The Manger." We'll wonder together at what this might invite us to "prepare room" in our inner life for Christ to be born in us.

Week 1 - The Stable Place

The Holy Family finds their way to a place of safety for the birth to come: a stable. It is an improvised space, not one you would think of for housing God, and yet it does, even in a dangerous and uncertain time and world.

Just so, I begin in prayer for you to find a "shelter space" in space and/or time amidst this season. Come and join us here at church for worship or activities. Give yourself an extra 5 or 10 minutes to linger with the morning, or the evening. Remember that the Child of God did not even sweat four walls as a requirement for a place of shelter. Any "place" you can carve out provides hope for a holy encounter.

Week 2 - A Manger Frame

Carpenters and poets understand the value of a frame. A frame—a structure—gives us something to hold on to, and something that can hold us. It both limits us and stretches us.

Jesus was laid down not in a carved and gilded crib made for him, but from rough timbers tacked together to hold the hay for animals. What spiritual frame might you give yourself in this Advent?

What practice might you invite yourself into? It could be as simple as a silent prayer for God to be with you and others each time you enter into a building... It could be a commitment to read a poem each morning. It could be

a new practice of prayer or meditation. It could be the commitment to observe a few minutes of quiet each night. Remember that the manger which held Jesus was pretty old and rickety by anyone's imagination, so if you feel a little unsteady in this practice, that's just fine! Let it shape and support you in a growing peace.

Week 3 - Resting in Hay

What does it mean that the first bedding for a new-born Christ was hay for the feeding of livestock?

One reading could be that we are called to make a place for Christ in the gifts of life and creation. So, be sure that you are fed this season: by things which nourish you, that give you joy, that strengthen you for the journey. Like a tired child, I think so many of us are so exhausted and depleted we're not fully aware of it. What simple gifts can you share with yourself? Can you rest in? You might consider joining for an outdoor pageant, sharing in the joy of our young people in this season.

Week 4 - Wrapped in Song

Finally, we remember that our tradition has interpreted so much of Jesus's mother Mary's thoughts and reflections on the wonder of his arrival in song. In this way, we can imagine that the final gift of Jesus's birth was the love and lullaby of his mother. There are songs, prayers, words, and traditions of this season. Let their "song" wrap you as you give thanks for the blessings of those who share them with us, and tenderly mourn those no longer with us. So, come and share in some of the music of this season in our church life: on Music Sunday, at Carols and Cocoa outside, or sing along from wherever you are!

We can recognize that these gifts of the Manger invite us into deeper living in our own lives, but also a commitment to make them more available to others and the wider world as well. There are surely places in this world where hope, peace, joy, and love are in short supply... where the holy might not be welcomed in: sheltered, supported, comforted, and wrapped in love... And yet... Christ is born in us again, anew, this season. May you receive this gift—and share it!

Sending prayers for Advent blessings for you... From me, From our staff, From our leadership, and from this gathered community of Christ.

Music Sunday Notes

I have been busy rehearsing the choirs (vocal and bell) and we are working on a special program of carols written by the American jazz musician Alfred Burt. Now don't let the word jazz put you off. These aren't stylized in the traditions of swing, bebop, or anything like that. These lovely carols pull from the great tradition of carol writing, ancient, intimate, textual, with hints of modernity. For Alfred, writing carols was a family tradition his father had begun, and after having graduation college studying music, Alfred took over the composing while using his father's, and family friend's, texts. These carols were sent as Christmas cards. These cards would have the text and music as well as artwork. Ultimately there were 15 carols written by Alfred before his untimely death. The Star Carol, which you will hear, was completed just days before he passed away and would be the last of the carols until Alfred's grandniece revived the family tradition. So please join us, your FCC music team, on this caroling journey and enjoy the story of old as told by the Burt family.

Fire Pit Gathering a Great Success! (L. Ventre, Fellowship Co-Chair)



The Falmouth Food Pantry, The Pastor's Discretionary Fund, and St. Mary's Join Resources

This past fall a Falmouth woman was found to be in urgent need of repairs at her home. She is elderly, living on a very limited social security and her home was not safe due to unsafe appliances. Foreside Community Church and The Episcopal of Saint Mary joined with the Falmouth Food Pantry to provide safe equipment for Sue. In addition to a completely new hot water system, her furnace was cleaned and made ready for the heating season.

Dear Friends,

The LP hot water tank in my home was an antique that could not be repaired. Due to the extreme cost of liquid petroleum and the malfunction of the tank, I used hot water sparingly for many years. Since it was "on demand" when water was called for, streams of hot water would spew out under pressure into a large tub and dragged nine feet across the cellar and dumped into a well...daily.

At times I boiled water for dishes to avoid stressing the valves and hearing a "splash" in the tub. I thought "getting by" was good enough until Dotty's visit to my

home and assured me this was not safe.

As of Friday, October 22, a new electric hot water tank has been installed and is the newest member of my humble home dubbed my "testimony tank."

FCC Book Club Update



> "The Vignes twin sisters will always be identical. But after growing up together in a small, southern black community and running away at age sixteen, it's not just the shape of their daily lives that is different as adults, it's everything: their families, their communities, their racial identities. Many years later, one sister lives with her black daughter in the same southern town she once tried to escape. The other passes for white, and her white husband knows nothing of her past. Still, even separated by so many miles and just as many lies, the fates of the twins remain intertwined. What will happen to the next generation, when their own daughters' storylines intersect?

> Weaving together multiple strands and generations of this family, from the Deep South to California, from the 1950s to the 1990s, Brit Bennett produces a story that is at once a riveting, emotional family story and a brilliant exploration of the American history of passing. Looking well beyond issues of race, The Vanishing Half considers the lasting influence of the past as it shapes a person's decisions, desires, and expectations,

and explores some of the multiple reasons realms in which people sometimes feel pulled to live as something other than their origins." (from Goodreads)

The Foreside Community Church Assists the Nash Family with an annual Labor/Trip of Love

Jay and Lisa Nash recently returned from The Pine Ridge Reservation, the home of Oglala Lakota tribe located in South Dakota. Traveling in their own vehicle on a trip they have been making for the past four years, they carried with them donations of toiletries, socks, and underwear collected from members and friends of the FCC. Also included in the conveyed goods, donations of winter quilts and coats from the Cobblestone Quilting Group. The drive took 4 days and time spent on the reservation was about 3 days.

These much needed donations were in support of the approximately 300 youth involved in the "Bears" project, whose primary focus is suicide prevention of tribal children from birth to their early 20's. And these needs are extremely great with the percentage of teen suicide in this population 150% higher than the rest of the United States. The grateful response by the reservation coordinators, volunteers, and representatives of the tribe when Jay and Lisa arrived was overwhelming at the sheer volume of supplies brought. Multiple thanks were extended to be returned to the FCC church.

The reservation has recently purchased two buildings, one to be developed into a library, and the second to accommodate youth whose parents may be absent from their day to day existence. Jay and Lisa will continue to bring support to the establishment of these two projects, including identifying the next level of need, and then planning a fifth trip next year with hopes of bringing further provisions and backing.

Continuing the Conversation on Church Signage

In the past two months, many of us have thoughtfully considered church signage and how it reflects The Foreside Community Church's identity as a congregation. The Governing Board received a request from a member to place a Black Lives Matter sign at the church entrance to demonstrate our solidarity with those who condemn hatred and racism. We felt that any decision about such a statement should be made in a deliberative way through a broader discussion with the congregation, so members and friends of FCC were invited to share their views during a Zoom discussion in October.

We learned that this is a complex issue. We heard support for displaying a BLM sign, and we heard reservations about the political overtones; we heard an appeal to stand as allies in the BLM movement, and we heard concerns that making such a stand was not broad enough; we heard that we are sensitive to wrongs being committed, and we heard reminders to align our actions and relationships with congregational statements. All agreed that we want FCC to be known as a welcoming community of faith, as well as thoughtful people whose actions reflect that faith. Continuing this conversation will help inform our decision about signage.

We'll begin by getting comfortable with the language we use to bear witness to our beliefs. As one Zoom participant noted, "The church is a welcoming, spiritual organization guided by the Bible. Jesus' teachings lead us somewhere." The United Church of Christ has expressed what it means to be "unapologetically Christian" in nine bold statements, and has helpfully provided its member churches with banners and other resources to define to the world what the denomination is about:

- * Protect the Environment
- * Care for the Poor
- * Embrace diversity
- * Reject racism
- * Forgive often
- * Love God
- * Fight for the powerless
- * Share earthly and spiritual resources
- * Enjoy this life

Beginning in the season of Epiphany, Geoff plans to explore each of these statements during worship, and incorporate them into our overall messaging, including our website, Sunday Bulletin, and exterior signage. The statements are meant to invite dialogue----to be not only a statement to the world but a challenge to us to live those things.
