Pastoral Notes

Carried by the Water

I'm writing to you as I'm preparing for this Sunday, in which Julia and I will bring Grace to be baptized. As her parent, I'm filled with joy at the prospect, and maybe a worried thought for all that might come after this sacred milestone and "starting line."

All of our lives are filled with exquisite beauty and wonder, vulnerability and uncertainty... but I see these things a little more acutely as I watch this tiny person greet the world right now.

Grace can take in new and wondrous things just by turning her head, entranced by a world in which she is learning about beauty, about love, about connection.

She will, in time, also join the world filled with challenges of life to come: successes, failures, great love, and great heartbreak...

We all, too, face uncertainty and struggle. We continue to face milestones: another season of respiratory ailments in public health; another general election cycle in which we feel more divided—and as if the systems of selfgovernance itself are weakening; as we grapple with a global climate that is shifting and changing in ways we cannot predict, in shifting landscapes of church and faith.

It's enough to wish I could offer Grace a cure to the human condition... and maybe spare a little extra for her parents... perhaps some for you, too, dear friends. Maybe you sometimes join in an anxious hour thinking of the world and your loved ones.

For many of us, there was a time in life when the primary purpose of faith might have been to give us *answers*, sureties that we hoped would inoculate us to the uncertainties and anxieties that life can bring. But, of course, if you're like me, you discovered that faith as "cure" inevitably failed to work as promised on the label, and brought with it further disillusionment.

In the baptismal prayer, I say that the water is a sign and seal of God's love which has been with us before we were born:

poured out for all who thirst, washing over all those who seek wholeness in You, and carrying Your children through the straights of all their days.

How might we think of faith as more that stream of water, carrying us, present with us as we face the reality that there is no cure for uncertainty, for grief, for change... but there may be a transformation: in the presence of God's love, a current in our lives we can float on, be carried by, even in our questions and uncertainty, even in the most turbulent of times.

In this next way of faith, we—as individuals, as the church, as communities—are called: not to moor ourselves to some preconceived answer—safe at harbor, but to discern the currents of the Spirit in which we move, trusting that though there may be the occasional rapids, we are being carried somewhere meaningful.

Grace—we all—will face challenges in uncertain futures. Parents, or baptism, cannot "save" us from those. Surely Jesus's own life and death teach us of realities of the world that may try to assert themselves as solid deathdealing facts.

But that the power of that life also teaches us that God is as present as an unending stream of living water, and offers assurance that we all will be loved as we struggle... and *in those struggles and in that love* we will find a greater solidarity and belonging with our beloved community, with humanity, and all creation. And *that* may, indeed, save us, through that divine presence with us and within us all.

So, I will look with joy to Sunday, and the reminder that the living water of God's love will carry us—all we hold dear, and this community of faith—through the straights and struggles and into greater wholeness and new life.

Explore Maine Audubon's Walking Trails on Sunday Afternoon, Nov. 13 ~ A Family Friendly Outing Hosted by FCC's Green Team

The Green Team at Foreside Community Church will host a nature walk around Gilsland Farm on Sunday afternoon, November 13, from 3 - 4 p.m.

Please join members and friends of all ages anytime after 2:45 p.m. for this family friendly outing to explore the late autumn wonders of Maine Audubon Society's beautiful, 65-acre sanctuary of walking trails and woods at the edge of the Presumpscot River estuary. The farm is located at 20 Gilsland Farm Road off Route 1 in Falmouth, just south of the intersection of Rt. 88 and Rt. 1.

We will set off at 3 p.m. after gathering just outside the Maine Audubon Society's environmental education center's entrance at the farm, adjacent to the large parking lot that is closest to the main trail head. Maine Audubon's Children's Discovery Center, art exhibits and nature store will be open until 4 p.m.

This will be the first in a series of new activities for those of us seeking community and inspiration as "Green Buddies." In the months ahead, we look forward to organizing regular opportunities to meet for walks and other outdoor play and to offer a series of new programs dedicated to conversations that build hope for the earth.

FCC has committed itself in the past to any number of responses to our world's environmental and climate crises and responsible creation care. We pray often in worship for those displaced by fire, famine and floods exacerbated by our changing climate. "Forty Days of Green" during Lent and our annual Earth Day and Blessing of the Animals services honor eco-justice concerns. Among other activities, the church also conducted an energy audit of our building leading to the installation of a new heating system and contracted with Garbage to Gardens to recycle our compostable waste.

Eco-justice and our relationship with the Earth remained in our consciousness during the pandemic as the Tuesday study group's read and discussed *Braiding Sweet Grass* and Susan and Cliff Gilpin arranged for the electric car and bike display at last spring's yard sale.

"Green Buddies" hopes to build on this history with your ideas, leadership and participation.
