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Pastoral Notes

Dear Foreside Friends,

Above all else, I want to be sure to remind that there are still a few days for you to register and join us for our "Why Church? All Church Conversation" on **Saturday, February 11 from 9am to 2pm. ** Gathering a diversity of gifts and perspectives from our congregation is an essential part of the church's work of discerning where and how we are called to minister and serve in the coming year, and to help us think about how we sustain and care for one another and the church as we do so.

Secondly, I want to invite you to journey with us through the upcoming season of Lent, beginning with our Ash Wednesday service on February 22nd at 6 p.m. This year our theme will be *Love Unbound*, reflecting on how Jesus's journey to Jerusalem, through the cross, and into resurrection life frees us to deeply know God's love.

Modern traditions have often labeled Lent a "penitent season," one marked by some additional prayers of confession, and perhaps a little self-denial. Of course, Lent's earliest form was not simply a season of penitence for its own sake, but of **preparation**. Those who were to rise in newness of life through baptism in the Easter dawn spent the days before in learning, practice, and formation for their full inclusion in the beloved community. It's a pattern that our confirmands are currently living out as we prepare to celebrate the gifts of the Spirit they will bring as they step into maturity and commitment to the church.

Viewed from an angle of preparation, I find Lent to be underrated as a source of *good news*: Jesus's teaching, example, and journey through the brokenness of death into new life engage and form us to receive God's love more fully. This is indeed love unbound: defying the forces of the world or of our own devising that would try to restrict or contain God's love... to only some, only the deserving, only the *correct*.

How might you—how might we—use this season of Lent, not to itemize the reasons we might not be worthy of love and belonging, but as a season of rejoicing that God has freely offered love and belonging just the same, and freed you to be transformed by that gift? Rather than a season in which we feel crushed under the weight of our failures—of cracks in our lives—we are shown in that God has placed loving treasure in these "earthen vessels" just the same. How could we live more boldly, more compassionately, and more justly freed by that offering and good news of love?

I look forward to walking this season with you,

As you know, we stewards look after the finances and physical plant of the church. We have the blessing of being somewhat more affluent than many churches these days. As a coastal community, the area attracts families with deeper pockets. By the same token, we are a modest institution, and have not "over-built," even when the numbers in church were greater and two services per Sunday were considered.

This past year has been a tough one for the stock market, and we have seen the value of our accounts fluctuate wildly (see treasurer's report). Through it all, we continue to hang in there and trust that like an ocean voyage, first we go down and then we go up.....and like the sea level, the trend is up. We have no plans to change our account investments.

Covid cut a swathe in our income from rentals, and that is slowly coming back. AA is a constant. Painting groups, rug hooking groups, etc., seem to come and go but remember, we have space that can be shared. Tell your friends.

It seems the more we enjoy ourselves and the less we care about the bottom line, the more money we make. This year the fair contributed more than \$19,000 to our yearly bottom line, better than in any recent years!

A couple of our trusty men pulled boxes of treasures out of every nook and cranny, some that had been squirreled away for years. We had extra space to spread out sales without a sit down café. 

The **MEMORIAL GARDEN** meetings have begun – We have a landscape architect who has offered his initial ideas. 




