I've been thankful for its encouragement to be God's people on a journey when much is changing around us, for the beauty and the face of Christ that we find in the diversity of life, and for the surety that though we are a people on the move, we are still a people "at home" with God. I have been thankful for those gifts and more in the last month, as I've heard it in the light of our recent All-Church Conversation, "Why Church?"

On Saturday, February 11th, 45 members and friends of FCC gathered on the campus of St. Mary's to talk and listen and listen together for where we might be being led as God's people on the journey here at FCC. Among us were those grounded in this community of faith for over 30 years, and our most recent new members who coverented with us in Japuary. We had some faith for

recent new members who covenanted with us in January. We had some faithful folks with a collection of over 80 birthday cards and one who just collected her driver's permit!

Above all, it was a joy to gather together, to share conversations and experiences of our church's life, to see the energy and commitment that we share for the ministry of the church, and indeed, to break bread together! (Thanks to fabulous baking from Jill Fox and Phil Gleason, and a delicious soup from Pete and Liz Ventre!)

We were graciously facilitated by our Associate Conference Minister, the Rev. Alexis Fuller-Wright, who took as our text for the day Exodus 13:17–22, which reminded us that while the people of Israel were in the wilderness,

The Lord went in front of them in a pillar of cloud by day, to lead them along the way, and in a pillar of fire by night, to give them light, so that they might travel by day and by night. Neither the pillar of cloud by day nor the pillar of fire by night left its place in front of the people.

There has been much of the past years that has felt like wilderness, and much that is uncertain, still. We considered how we might look and move towards those pillars of God's presence, even as the longer term direction may yet be unclear.

We spent time together telling the stories of how we first experienced Foreside Community Church: what drew us in and felt like God was calling us to this faith home. We reflected on those stories in which we have felt proud of our community; and felt the Holy Spirit especially alive among us. We challenged each other to imagine the impact we dream our congregation having as we live out the unique gifts and ministries of this body of Christ. Throughout, we heard several themes developing, including:

- Supporting Spiritual Formation
- Gathering Our Lives and Sharing our Stories
- Public Witnessing / "Making Our Christianity Visible"

So what happens now? To begin, there is more listening to do. We recognize not all our members could join us on the 11th and would like to hear from different demographics and groups of the church not heard from on that day. Additionally, stay tuned for some creative ways to share notes and reflections in our Fellowship space during coffee hour.

At the end of our time together in February, those present who were willing joined "Action Planning Groups" that will be tasked with considering possible next step activities and projects aligned with our developing themes. We'll invite others to join as they feel called to this work. Those groups will report back to the Governing Board in the spring with recommendations as we make plans together for this next part of our journey.

As always, it is a gift to be on the way with this congregation and with God!




#### ~ An Invitation for Lent To Reflect on Friday Mornings with the Seekers Group

#### Mbabaali School Updates



For many years the Foreside community has supported the Mbabaali School for Orphans. This grassroots orphanage for 273 children is located seven miles outside the capitol city of Kampala in Uganda. Twenty-three years ago it was organized and continues to be nurtured by the heroic efforts of James Kyeynue along with a small team of dedicated staff. In order to feed and educate the children, James not only teaches but walks many miles each day to beg for medical assistance, food supplies, and school equipment. There have been many difficult challenges, but James is a man of great faith and practical skills.

Over the years James has personally visited the Foreside Church on three occasions and he has inspired our congregation to join in his work. We purchased his first cow that we named Emily. Our children raised the funds to help build a shelter and food for Emily and she has proudly given birth to several calves. Several years ago the orphanage was able to purchase and clear land for a farm and this has provided not only food for the children but enough extra produce to sell for much needed funds. In addition, the farm has provided a place to train some of the children for future work as farmers. Hardship has hit Mbabaali many times, but the pandemic brought terrible hardships. Traveling to the farm became very dangerous and the staff and children suffered from greatly reduced food supplies. But through all of the challenges James and his staff have continued to teach and care for the children. This week he shared the very exciting news that twenty of his high school seniors qualified for the state exams. Of these twenty teens, sixteen scored at the highest level and the other four qualified at the next level. Because education is not generally free in Uganda, by obtaining these high scores these young people will receive state scholarships that will pay for college. The love and dedication of the staff that educates, feeds, and loves these children is an inspiration. If



AND BEFORE YOU GO...



**The Foreside Community Church Outreach Ministry** has generously given seed money for the past three years to buy gift cards for families of sickle cell disease (SCD) patients at the Maine Children's Cancer Program. Other members of the FCC congregation have also contributed generously and individually over this time.

Most children with SCD, who inherited the disease from both parents, often present with symptoms in the first year of life. This is an incurable and painful disease. The misshapen red cells become wedged in blood vessels causing great pain and affecting organs throughout the body. These young patients deal with complications of this disease throughout their lives. MCCP has seen dramatic increases in this population in recent years—from 15 in 2016 to 66 in 2023. There is an expectation that these numbers will continue to grow.

Many immigrant and asylum seekers look for treatment shortly after they arrive in this country. Often upon introduction, the medical team finds that these families do not have basic needs like warm clothes, food, or money for medication, and they may not yet be eligible for general assistance from the state or within their host communities. Cold weather is a documented trigger for SCD symptoms.

Five years ago, I heard a talk given by Dr. Aaron Weiss, a pediatric hematologist-oncologist, who treats sickle cell children. During his speech Dr. Weiss expressed how frustrating it was for the treatment team to recognize the serious needs these families were facing yet having no way to give non-medical assistance. I reached out to Dr. Weiss, and we came up with the idea of obtaining gift cards that case-assigned social workers could distribute to families with dire immediate needs, hence helping their young patients.

The picture above is on the front of a thank-you card I received last week on behalf of the church with comments from each of the medical team. One comment was, "Thank you is just not enough." Another said, "The funds you and your church community donate makes a difference every single day." Dr. Weiss reiterated how significant the gift cards are and he said, "Thank you from the bottom of all our hearts." I think the members and friends of FCC can be assured that our efforts and monetary gifts are truly significant and greatly appreciated, especially with these young recipients.


