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Pastoral Notes

ADDING TO OUR NUMBER

Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved. - Acts 2:46–47

To any preacher who might be riding a high from the festival rejoicing and gatherings of Easter Sunday (like me!), the lectionary scripture readings in the season that follows are often a cold splash of water. We read stories of the "followers of the Way" in the Acts of the Apostles, including the mass inspiration that nearly every event, every sermon seemed to invite: here Peter baptized 3,000 in one day, there 5,000 believed, here the apostles accomplished great signs and wonders before Jerusalem.

This early church seems to have been excited by the wave of numbers in those early days, yet modern followers of Jesus can make ourselves anxious about the tide going out the other way. As the fresh followers of Jesus shared all their possessions in common joyfully, we who make daily news from numbers like GDP or unemployment or interest rates, may fret some great deficit to our lives.

But, of course, Acts maybe offers us a challenge... the numbers can only tell the story of the church if they tell the story of lives transformed and called into discipleship, or people offered healing and new life, or of a deeper sense of connection to the Holy through all and in all.

I have not yet had my day in which I baptized 3,000... I'm not sure I would enjoy it much since I probably wouldn't even know their names! Still, day by day, God is working and expanding the life of the Spirit in all sorts of way, and, yes, some of those ways even have numbers... So, here's Holy Week by the numbers:

At the 8:30 a.m. Easter service our children transformed the **1 cross** masterfully created by Mark Munson, decorating it with over **150 flowers** prepared by Gail Adshead. Knitters

and other volunteers stuffed and hid over **200 Easter Eggs** for the annual Easter Egg Hunt. I am holding out hope that maybe the kids didn't find all of them, and I'll be rewarded on a walk around the building...

At the 10:30 a.m. service, **5 young people confirmed** their baptismal promises, taking their place in the full stature and responsibility of membership in this body of Christ after **7 months of preparation**. On their journey to confirmation, they jointly **visited 10 elders** of our congregation, did **50 hours of community service** work, and participated in **10 worship services with other faith communities** as they learned about our own. It also bears mentioning that **15 adults—their parents and their mentors—journeyed with them** through their preparations, and learned things along the way. I'm sorry... **16**. I was learning, too.

Overall, on Easter Sunday, over 250 people said, "Christ is risen, indeed!" with us by the bay, in the sanctuary, or online in worship. 15 Ministers of Worship and Readers led us through Holy Week liturgies and scriptures. Our Music ministries prepared 12 special music offerings during the week, inviting us to sing Holy Week's deep traditions, and even to learn 3 new hymns.

Sharing from the gifts of our lives, we raised **over \$2,100** for **our Neighbors in Need fund**. This offers support for members of our wider community in times of challenge, loss, and hardship, and an assurance that God's love and presence is with them and working for resurrection life, even—and perhaps especially—in those difficult times.

We can draw the circle wider: in recent years, you have been a place of training and supporting seminarians as they prepare for, and enter ministry, and you are a home for clergy who serve in other settings... so you helped make Easter exactly what it was and needed to be for **four other congregations**, and for over **400 worshippers**.

Our Justice and Outreach partners made a difference on Easter outside church walls: in the gift of bread broken and shared through the Falmouth Food pantry, or in offering healing on the street through Grace Street Ministry. Around the world that day, 100 children were fed at Looc Soup kitchen in the Philippines, and the Mbabaali Memorial School was able to provide care and education to its Easter blessings and Christ's new life be with us all, **260 students** in Uganda.




Worship in the sanctuary...

It was a very educational day at the Statehouse, as well as surprisingly enjoyable and delicious. The Christmas Fair Queen, Carol Ward, dreamed this up with Representative Kuhn for an intriguing auction item at last year's fair.. We recently met Amy in the Statehouse rotunda for an early morning tour of this beautiful historic building, seeing both Senate & House chambers, the caucus rooms & much more.

The first thing that happened suggesting this was going to be a really neat experience was promptly running into the Democratic majority leader, Rachel Talbot Ross. She went out of her way, even as she was beginning a typical hectic day, to pause and invite us into her office. She really knocked us over with her relaxed welcoming manner.

We then followed Amy into the Democratic caucus room where all Democratic representatives meet to review and strategize on the day's legislative agenda. She introduced us to a number of our other local representatives. They all wanted to know about this most unique auction item. It seemed a statehouse visit was first ever to be auctioned at a church fair. Everyone loved it.

After the caucus, we had a break back in the rotunda. The halls were packed. The big draw turned out to be Maine Farm & Aquaculture day at the Statehouse. 
FCC Monthly Book Club Updates

What's in a name?...



AND BEFORE YOU GO... March 19th marked the culmination of a month-long project involving the entire FCC community, the **Bucket Brigade for Maine Needs.** Over the course of three weeks, congregation members and friends brought in donated items for cleaning buckets which were assembled for Maine families.

The message that served as the genesis for the Bucket Brigade was delivered during Sunday worship on February 19 when Tara Balch, Communications Director from Maine Needs shared the mission of the organization during the service Mission Moment. As the only staff at the organization, Tara works with many volunteers to provide needed items to Mainers all over the state. The cleaning kits created by FCC are being provided to individuals moving into apartments or hotel rooms to allow

them to clean the space as they make it their own. Items in the kits include: dish soap, toilet cleaner, trash bags, sponges, soap, shampoo, and toothbrushes.

During the afternoon of the 19th, over 30 members and friends of all ages gathered in Fellowship Hall at FCC to assemble the many items. Volunteers sorted the supplies into piles and then, one by one, packed the buckets creating kits. In addition, attendees created hand-made cards with messages of encouragement to include in each of these kits. In the end 35 cleaning kit buckets, as well as 27 bags, were created and dropped off at Maine Needs, from there being distributed to families and individuals as needed.

Facilitator and Christian Education Ministry chair Wendy Tracy shared: "This project from the heart was a wonderful way for all members and friends of FCC to be involved as we give back to the wider community: from the youngest members who helped pass out fliers, to our teens who made the signs advertising the project, from the Justice and Outreach Ministry who provided the 30 buckets for us to pack, to all those who provided donations of items and money. In particular, thanks to the teamwork of J&O chairwoman Dotty Blanchette, Stewardship Ministry member Debra Coyman, and co-chair Liz Ventre from the Fellowship Ministry, which provided refreshments. What a delight to work together as a church family to make a difference in our wider community."
