## Pastoral Notes

### Learning in Love

*Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? But strive for the greater gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way. - 1 Corinthians 12:27-31*

The Apostle Paul was—if not the first, one of the first—of those who made theological sense of the blessing of both *unity* and *diversity* in the gathering life of the church he called the Body of Christ. These early followers of the risen Jesus were being called into a new form of community together, a new identity and belonging... *and* they would also have unique gifts they each carried. All were one. *Some* were called to be apostles, some leaders, and some... were teachers. All of them, Paul would conclude, were called and rooted in love.

I am grateful for the many gifts and experiences that have called many here to be teachers: here at FCC and in the wider community. Even more, I'm grateful for the many forms that teaching takes. Yes, there are those who lead classroom experiences for young and for old-er. There are those who love to teach the history and scriptures of our tradition alongside me, but there are teachings in all sorts of other forms. You have been a teacher in this church if you shared how to call the elevator, or if you guided someone in making Christmas Fair chili... you have been a teacher if you helped a visitor feel welcome in worship, or if you called others into new forms of service that maybe they were a little nervous to try.

And... you have been a teacher if you have simply shared your experiences and your life here with others in loving community. I know, at the least, you have probably taught me, and others. All of us share in this gift and calling of *learning*. Not all may be known for their teaching... but by being one in a community devoted to learning and growing in the Spirit... we all end up teaching and learning each other together.

This year, that teaching and learning has been taking new forms for many: we have pivoted to a volunteer-led Sunday School model, thanks to the gifts of those members who find joy in walking alongside our children as they journey the path of faith. Confirmation Mentors helped young adults take the next step, committing themselves to grow and learn as full members of the church. A new Adult Education ministry has begun, offering unique experiences

from a poetry reading to a lay-led exploration of the New Testament. We are blessed with a variety of gifts and of teachers.

**On Sunday, June 11th, come to worship and celebrate the gifts of education we have shared in the past year.**

We will give thanks for the faithful volunteers who have served as Sunday School teachers. We will call our young people into next stages of their growth and exploration of faith, sharing bibles with those who are going into fifth grade or higher. And we will bless our graduating young adults as they prepare for the next leg of their journey. And... we'll have an ice cream social after worship... I'm not sure how to make that fit the education theme... but I know it's important anyway!

Significantly, in your recent years, Foreside Community Church has been a site for developing skills of those preparing for ministry, and for receiving their gifts in your midst. One of those gifted ministers, **The Rev. Alyssa Lodewick, will be installed as the settled Pastor and Teacher of Woodfords Church in Portland on Sunday, June 18th at 2:00pm.** I hope that if you are able, you'll consider joining us as we celebrate Alyssa's call—and the call of the Woodford's community—to share their gifts together in ministry.

Thanks be to God for all the varied gifts, backgrounds, and experiences we can share, and the Spirit which calls them into meaning and purpose as we seek to share and grow in God's love.

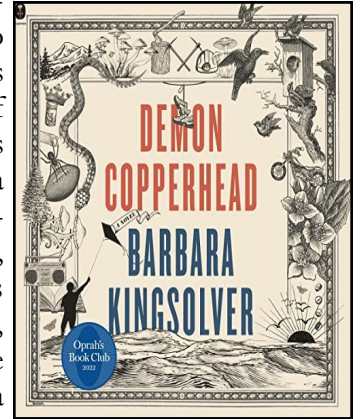
We are taking the summer off and will return in September to discuss Demon Copperhead by Barbaran Kingsolver:

"Demon Copperhead is set in the mountains of southern Appalachia. It's the story of a boy born to a teenaged single mother in a single-wide trailer, with no assets beyond his dead father's good looks and copper-colored hair, a caustic wit, and a fierce talent for survival. In a plot that never

pauses for breath, relayed in his own unsparing voice, he braves the modern perils of foster care, child labor, derelict schools, athletic success, addiction, disastrous loves, and crushing losses. Through all of it, he reckons with his own invisibility in a popular culture where even the superheroes have abandoned rural people in favor of cities. Many generations ago, Charles Dickens wrote David Copperfield from his experience as a survivor of institutional poverty and its damages to children in his society. Those problems have yet to be solved in ours. Dickens is not a prerequisite for readers of this novel, but he provided its inspiration. In transposing a Victorian epic novel to the contemporary American South, Barbara Kingsolver enlists Dickens' anger and compassion, and above all, his faith in the transformative powers of a good story."

### Restoring and Rebuilding Maine's Natural Biodiversity Topic of April 26 Green Team Program

The final program of this winter into spring's "Four Ways to Love the Earth" series focused on ways to help restore and rebuild Maine's natural biodiversity by planting the native wildflowers, shrubs, and trees that support the widest array of wildlife.

Andrew Tufts, manager of Maine Audubon's Bringing Nature Home initiative, introduced us to many of the "keystone" plants that offer the most food for the most species. All are listed on Maine Audubon's native plants finder website,

A former counselor at Maine Audubon camps and landscape architect, Andrew described the paradigm shift underway in the garden world to focus on the local plants that have evolved for thousands of years in tandem with bees, moths, birds and caterpillars that carry their pollen and assure their propagation.

Beach plum and shad trees, butterfly weed, black willow, high bush blueberries, New England asters, Joe Pye weed and swamp milkweed are a few of the many recommended plants that the Wild Seed Project has catalogued and that are available for purchase on-line through Maine Audubon after June 23.

The Justice and Outreach Ministry is pleased to share that College Guild located in Brunswick will be presenting the June 25 Mission Moment.

"College Guild was founded in 2001 by two people who had been closely involved with incarcerated people and were interested in issues tied to mass incarceration. Our mission is to provide free correspondence courses that connect incarcerated people with a community beyond prison walls, fostering mutual respect through a shared passion for learning. Research has shown that incarcerated people who have participated in prison education programs have a 50%-reduced chance of returning to prison. College Guild offers classes for incarcerated people which are designed to be thought-provoking and fun, to encourage objectivity and creativity, and to provide an opportunity to spend time constructively. Our unique courses cover subjects in science, writing, history, art, and culture. They are developed and administered by volunteers who offer special interests and expertise that they wish to share with students. College Guild's non-accredited status and non-traditional curricula allows for exploration into diverse subject areas and gives us the freedom to reach more people and provide feedback which educates students while providing them with encouragement and respect. Our program is inclusive to students of all identities." Please try to join us on Sunday, June 25.

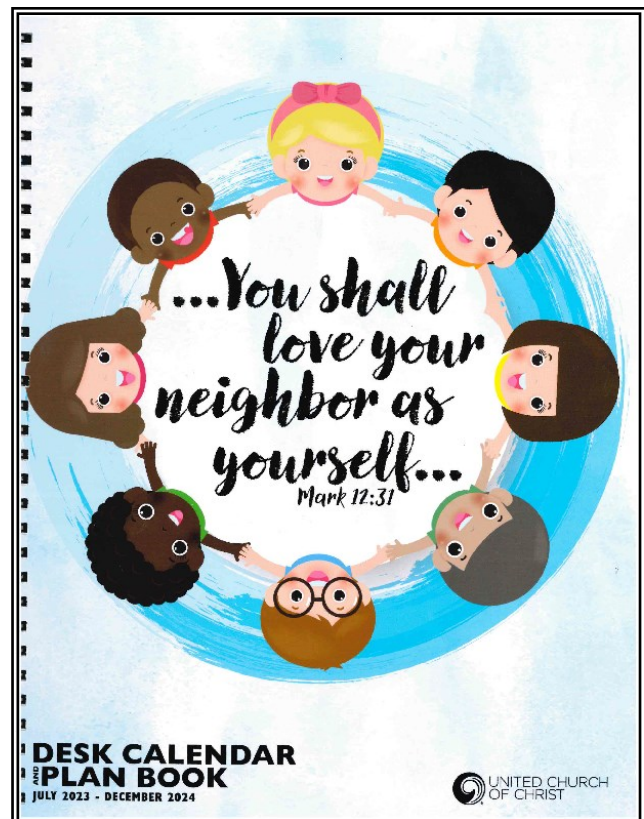

Little Children of the World (LCW) is a Christian min-  
istry dedicated to helping street children and children at  
risk in the Philippines through sponsorship, scholar-  
ships, and programs addressing urgent needs. These  
children are victims of extreme poverty and/or neglect,  
as well as vulnerable to abuse. LCW brings help and  
hope to more than 700 children through sponsorship and  
ministers to over 6000 people. LCW is the USA-based  
parent organization to Little Children of the Philip-  
pines in Dumaguete City, Philippines. [https://

Nadim Haque has been in the Maine State Prison for 26 of the 56 years of his life. During this time he has helped hundreds of residents by helping prisoners complete their GED diplomas. He has helped college administrators place residents in courses that match their skills. He has volunteered as a handler for Mission Working Dogs in training (service dogs) and more! Although convicted of a very serious crime at the age of 20, Nadim has worked hard to improve his life and the lives of others. He now has a goal of completing his college degree that was interrupted when he was imprisoned. Although in Maine there are now scholarships available for "residents," Nadim is not an American citizen so he is not eligible for financial assistance. FC C member Lara Rodas, always an advocate for those needing justice, applied to the Justice and Outreach Ministry for a Good Samaritan Grant. In the name of The Foreside Community Church, UCC, J&O made a donation of \$400, and with two additional personal checks was able to donate a total of \$1,000.00, enough to pay for one entire needed course.

Although Maine has many programs that support the incarcerated through education, this is not the case in all states. However there is a Maine program that requires each volunteer commit to only two to four hours of "homework" each month. Jesus said; *"I was imprisoned and you came to visit me."* This program, the one Nadim is enrolled in is College Guild. Guild does not ask volunteers to physically visit a prison but rather provides the opportunity to offer encouragement and communication with the incarcerated through responses to their answers to a selected non-credit class. The volunteer community member is referred to as a "Reader." The Reader responds in writing once a month to the document prepared by the inmate. All communications go through the College Guild manager. I have participated in this program for several months and find that it is very stimulating to have to think about the subject and then the answers provided by the inmate. There are at times painful reminders that the person receiving my feedback is living in very difficult circumstances but it is also satisfying to know that the writing the person has done is providing a learning opportunity. It has been proven that prison education in its many forms reduces returns to prison by more than 50%. A snapshot of the website content is also included on page 7 of this edition.

College Guild staff will be personally sharing more about their work on **Sunday, June 25 as the monthly Mission Moment presenter.** In the meantime, anyone who would like to explore this way of serving others can contact College Guild directly by going to [www.collegeguild.org](http://www.collegeguild.org), or contacting me at [dorothyb@maine.rr.com](mailto:dorothyb@maine.rr.com)
