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Pastoral Notes

Dear Foreside Friends,

I am loving the holy pace of Lent as we prepare and make our way towards Holy Week and Easter rejoicing. It is a gift to worship, to serve, and to live among you as we follow Jesus to Jerusalem, to the cross, but then... beyond any tomb into newness of life.

As we shared at our annual meeting, the Governing Board and I have been preparing for my upcoming sabbatical this spring. In the United Church of Christ, it is recommended that congregations offer their pastors a three-month sabbatical every five years of service for learning, renewal, and rest. This practice strengthens and supports the partnership between a settled pastor and the church, bringing new energy, creativity, and ideas for what we pray is a lasting and fruitful ministry together. I hope you know that I receive this gift of time—both for me, and for my family—as a gift. One for which I am deeply thankful.

Some have asked what I will be doing during my time away. Though I have had other sabbaticals devoted to travel and study, this time will be focused closer to home. We expect this to be a precious time for Julia and me, with Grace and with our extended family: Grace in a time ers, and rest in the good pastoral care of our own Rev. of wonder and new experiences, and our parents in some of the tender challenges and changes of age. While I am away, I will pray for you... and for all the gifts of generations before and after you.

Sabbatical also offers me a chance for personal reading and study farther afield than those books which are part of my usual practice of Bible study and preaching... but might be with some reflection! It is a gift to be able to look and discover new images, new words, new ideas for how God is at work in the world, and how we are called by the Spirit to follow in Christ's Way. While I am away, I will pray for you... and for new discoveries of beauty, language, and arts that might give you glimpses of the divine.

I will also admit that the last five years of ministry amid challenge and change for our congregation—and for the

world—have been deeply rewarding, exhilarating in the pace of adaptation, and... a little tiring! I'm thankful for the reminder, and the opportunity, to experience the holiness of rest. As much as I love to preach of sabbath, of how we are created to be loved as a body at rest... sometimes I can fall out of practice! Jesus spent a lot of time trying to encourage his disciples to "come away and rest." It didn't always work out how they planned, but it was core to the ministry he taught. While I am away, I will pray for you... and for you also to know you are beloved at rest.

After Easter Sunday I will take my leave for these three months. I will be unavailable for pastoral services between April 1st and June 30th. During this time, as always, leadership of the congregation rests in the care of the Governing Board and its officers. See the following page for wonderful plans and planning that our leaders have prepared for this time. Ministry teams will continue to operate as usual, and you can look forward to all the gifts of spring in our community and congregation.

After the sabbatical time, I expect that I will take my customary vacation in the first half of July, returning to full ministry among you on Monday, July 22nd. You can look forward to another wonderful season of Prayers on the Patio thanks to the Ministers of Worship and other lay lead-Joan Murray in July.

For my part, I will miss you while I am away, but I will also rejoice in you—in all the strength, love, and resurrection joy of this community—and I will look forward to reuniting in the summer!

Dear Friends,

First of all, I want to say how happy I am to know that we are giving our beloved Pastor this extended and restorative "Sabbath". It is part of the call agreement we entered into with Geoff five years ago.

When we consider all that has occurred over the past five years, the need for rest is clear. Geoff, who had just begun ministering here, was tasked with trailblazing a path for us through the unknown terrain of a global pandemic, where all of our normal ways of sharing church life and worship, were suddenly off limits. Geoff called on faith, ingenuity, and his tech skills and background. Together with Trevor and David, hybrid services were created, but not without speedbumps, detours, and potholes to maneuver! Geoff modeled the perseverance and problem solving we would all require for the next couple of years.

These were years when Foreside Community experienced huge personal losses, through the heart-breaking deaths of several of our dearest friends. When we most needed to gather together, we could not. Geoff again found ways for us to virtually meet and grieve. In the midst of this, he and Julia suffered unimaginable loss. How difficult was it for us not to be able to hold them in a true embrace at that moment. Somehow, battered as he was, Geoff returned to us and his heart's commitment to be minister.

And finally, the sun rose again and baby Grace arrived. She may as well have been named "Manna from Heaven" as we all desperately hungered for something to celebrate. This joy fed our souls – and continues to do so. Yet joy in this case brings an even greater need for rest, as all of us parents can testify!

Thank you to every member for honoring our commitment to provide this time of sabbatical for our cherished minister.

While Geoff is away, the Governing Board has selected a ministry *team* to serve with us. I am excited that we have invited **The Rev. Cheryl Anderson and Sarah Whitfield** to be Sabbatical Pastors together, from April through June. They both bring wonderful and diverse gifts, and a deep love and commitment to church with them. They also bring a spirit of collaboration and learning; having met one another as they both guest preached at a local congregation, they sought out this team approach for their time with us.

Cheryl, as you will see, brings many years of faithful ministry experience with her, as well as new directions she is exploring and teaching in mindfulness and meditation. Sarah brings gifts of music, of leadership in education and in community life, and her perspective as she is preparing for ministry in the church. Cheryl and Sarah will together serve as a half-time ministry team, sometimes alternating duties, sometimes sharing them. You can be a gift to their ministry by helping them to get to know you, to know of any prayer or pastoral concerns that may arise, *and* by shar-



ing in some of the ministry of our church with them.

The Reverend Cheryl Anderson is a retired, second career UCC pastor. She served the First Congregational Church of Washington, Connecticut for 22 years. She and her husband, Scott Tilden, relocated full time to their condo in Portland in March of 2019. She is a member of State Street Church in Portland, but

most Sundays, can be found supplying the pulpit for other churches around Maine. Cheryl is a certified teacher of Mindfulness Meditation and offers classes through the Osher Life-Long Learning Institute at USM, and through State Street Church. Over the course of her varied career, she has taught elementary school music, directed a church choir, called contra dances, and was the Director of Interpretation and Education at Hancock Shaker Village in Massachusetts for 18 years. Cheryl is a spinner, weaver, knitter, and open-hearth cook, loves to sail and sing and play guitar.

Sarah Whitfield is a native of Wiscasset and is currently a student at the Maine School of Ministry having recently finished her first of three certificates. She regularly serves as a substitute lay preacher at several small churches in Maine. In her full-time job, she serves as the director of annual giving for the University of Southern Maine Foundation and is also the chair of the board of selectmen in Wiscasset. She's a graduate of Colby College, American

University, and received her Ph.D. from the University of Southern Maine. Additionally, she plays the flute, is a big live music fan, and loves traveling the world.

Let us all give them a warm welcome to our community life, which begins on their first Sunday, April 7th! Please mark your calendars. It is the first Sunday after



Easter and Communion Sunday, and it will be our first chance to thank Cheryl and Sarah for their presence, their ministry, and the gifts they bring.

Winter Green Team Program Wrap-Ups The Problem of Plastics....Why should we care? and How to make Your Home Greener



Kathie McCatherin and Nancy Olmstead coordinated a program about the problem with plastic waste on our planet. In short, only 5-6% of plastics that we put in our bins for recycling are actually recycled. The source of the problem is our over-

dependence on plastics and the solution is to greatly reduce and eliminate our reliance on this substance that never completely "goes away".

Nancy provided a brief synopsis of what is going on at the State level to reduce plastic use. She also touched on a variety of community groups who are working on the problem and ways that we can all advocate.

Lastly, two members of the Falmouth Conservation Commission spoke about what was happening at the local level. Handouts "Resources, Important Topics, and Ways to Advocate" and "Plastic Alternatives and Ideas" are available from Kathie or Nancy. As well as a copy of the presentation

On Feb. 7th, Fred Horch and Peggy Siegel of Sustainable Practice joined an audience of about twenty people via Zoom to discuss the top twenty sustainable best practices to make our homes earth friendly. Composting is at the top of list which also includes the advice to recycle metal glass, and clean carboard, but not plastic since plastic is essentially nonrecyclable.

Fred answered audience questions in some depth on topics including electric vehicles, solar energy, the latest on electric batteries, and heat pumps. Fred's "Guidebook for Sustainability" can be downloaded from his website, www.SustainablePractice.life.

Volunteer Opportunity: State Street Shelter March 17th-23rd

This cold weather reminds us to be grateful for shelter and for the power of the Spirit who works among us and through us to make a difference in the lives of our neighbors. The State Street Church has been working to prepare a new shelter space. A coalition of faith communities will come together so 4-5 families with children (20-24 people who have had harrowing journeys) will have a safe, warm place to go each night this winter and spring.

The Foreside Community Church and Falmouth Congregational Church have signed up to staff Sunday,

March 17th through Saturday, March 23rd

We will need 2-3 volunteers per night:

- One person who will cover the 6:00-8:30 p.m. shift welcoming families as they arrive for the evening (serving with a State Street Church Host);
- Two people who will cover the 8:30 p.m. to 7:30 a.m. shift;
- Volunteers will stay on cots in an area near the families in the basement shelter area;
- There will be mentoring and orientation as needed so volunteers feel comfortable. Volunteers will undergo a simple background check.



<u>Great Alone</u> by Kristen Hannah in February. It was a wide ranging discussion about the themes of love and hate, abuse, and a desperate family's search for a new beginning, all set in the remote Alaskan wilderness. It was a real page turner and gave me a new appreciation for the powers of both human nature and Mother nature.



Our book selection for March will be <u>The Personal Librarian</u> by Marie Benedict.

"The Personal Librarian tells the story of an extraordinary woman, famous for her intellect, style, and wit, and shares the lengths to which she must go—for the protection of her family and her legacy—to preserve her carefully crafted white identity in the racist world in which she lives.

In her twenties, Belle da Costa Greene is hired by J. P. Morgan to curate a collection of rare manuscripts, books, and artwork for his newly built Pierpont Morgan Library. Belle becomes a fixture on the New York society scene and one of the most powerful people in the art and book world, known for her impeccable taste and shrewd negotiating for critical works as she helps build a world-class collection.

But Belle has a secret, one she must protect at all costs. She was born not Belle da Costa Greene but Belle Marion Greener. She is the daughter of Richard Greener, the first Black graduate of Harvard and a well-known advocate for equality. Belle's complexion isn't dark because of her alleged Portuguese heritage that lets her pass as white—her complexion is dark because she is African American."



Mission Moment Updates ~ On February 11th FCC's Mission Moment was presented by Navy veteran Kathy Kroll, who has been a part of the **Maine Adaptive** program for 39 years as volunteer and board member. Kathy and her husband Bob, also a Navy vet and who joined us in the pews and then afterwards for Q&A during fellowship coffee, have championed Maine Adaptive's specialty program and Mission topic, **Veterans No Boundaries** since its inception 20 years ago. Kathy is extremely compassionate about this veterans program and shared one experience



that she still carries with her. "One memorable veteran, that I had the privilege to ski with was a Medal of Honor nominee from Fort Drum," she said. "He was dealing with post-traumatic stress disorder and physical injuries from his combat tour in Afghanistan. I remembered he told me that he didn't "feel athletic anymore." He had spent the entire first day on the beginner slope utilizing outriggers for balance. It was clear he didn't need that adaptive equipment on his second day and with patience and trust he starting skiing using ski poles. As we progressed through the day, he was challenged on steeper terrain, and he met every challenge. By the end of the day he was the lead guide for a visually impaired volunteer. I still have that picture today of a proud soldier wearing a guide bib, who trusted us enough to believe in himself. It was priceless!" Founded in 1982, Maine Adaptive is now the largest year-round adaptive recreation program in the state of Maine for adults and children with disabilities. Over 400 volunteers assist athletes in appreciating the joys and challenges of sports participation. Maine Adaptive provides over 3,500 lessons winter and summer thanks to the generous support of individuals, businesses corporations, and foundations that sustain their programs every year. 
