Pastoral Notes

The Ground We Stand On: Faith, Hope, and Love

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set free those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor... Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." - Luke 4:18–19, 21

Dear Foreside Friends,

There are many for whom the last weeks of our national life have been painful: those who are anxious about many things, not limited to:

our trans siblings and their families who have had protections and rights removed through regulations.

agencies, researchers, workers, and—above all—program recipients who have seen essential public funding disrupted.

the fragile web of our world as environmental regulations were halted or repealed.

those who have been in the past, or are now, threatened by political violence.

Like many of you, I've been praying and thinking about how the Church universal, Foreside Community Church, and indeed all of us as ministers in Christ's church might be called to respond in the days—and years ahead. I'm not sure I always clearly see the path yet... so I have been focused on where we start.

I hear in Luke's telling Jesus's proclamation that message of the prophets be embodied and made real in human life. I know that to embody that good news in the body of Christ in these days will involve the diversity of gifts, of conscience, of perspectives that all our ministry contains. I also hope for a common grounding that can sustain in the work of compassion and justice in trying times—yes, for holy truth telling—but also including the right practice of sabbath, renewal, and joy.

"Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you; I appointed you a prophet to the nations." -Jeremiah 1:5

First, I pray we prioritize the understanding, naming, and claiming of each of us and every other as created in the divine image. Partly, because this understanding must ground our ethic for the treatment of others: those we would stand with, and those we would dispute with. Partly, this is simply because if we are to stand, we must find that solid ground beneath our feet which can anchor and support us. The prophets, and certainly Jesus, *started* from a clear place of being created and loved by God. That is an essential in a world in which we will sometimes hold unpopular opinions! I also want to say that the regular return to community, friends, partners, or others who can remind us of our own worth and belovedness is not optional, but essential.

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and put a new and right spirit within me. - Psalm 51:10

Second, I think those who would follow Jesus are being invited into a great clarification of our faith's deepest values. We face a time which has compromised and conflicted much of American Christian life: a harm-ful reframing of Christianity which seeks and revels in power over others, in cruelty, and in force and

violence. It is a distortion of our faith both deeply alien to my understanding of the Gospel, yet also one where elements of our own traditions and common life have been fertile soil for these "thorns."

In the civil rights era, Thomas Merton reflected on the ways in which his own faith had held sway over and done violence to the lives of others, and sought a new way:

Growth, survival and even salvation may depend on the ability to sacrifice what is fictitious and unauthentic in the construction of one's moral, religious or national identity. One must then enter upon a different creative task of reconstruction and renewal. This task can be carried out only in the climate of faith, hope and of love: these three must be present in some form, even if they amount only to a natural belief in the validity and significance of human choice, a decision to invest human life with some shadow of meaning, a willingness to treat other people as other selves. 1

Merton's insistence on a "climate of faith, hope, and love" to do the work of reconstructing and renewing a faith built on the self-giving, poured out compassion of the living Christ makes me thankful for this church. For we will need each other as we seek to understand some of the painful parts of our own tradition and beliefs that may be entangled in violence or injustice as we seek to grow in a faith more fully rooted in Christ's love and ministry.

If I speak in the tongues of humans and of angels but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. - 1 Corinthians 13:1

During trying times, then, we will speak. As we do, we should not fall away from telling stories of great love and service which can inspire us and others, just as much as we might feel called speak out in outrage. So, read on in this *Steeple-notes*... here are prophets who speak truths, angels who say "be not afraid," saints who welcome the stranger in... who dance with the refugee, who warm their hands in the cold, those who gather to learn and discuss the deep power and meaning of the cross as we move towards Lent, that we might proclaim that truth, those who build beloved community in joy and love...

Thanks be to God, friends, that we find ourselves in this community of faith, where faith, hope, and love abide... for we trust that these three will last... and they will root us to the firm ground of Christ's resurrection life and hope as we stand for God's dream for the world.



State Street Winter Family Shelter

A HUGE THANK YOU to Justice & Outreach!

Many of you know that our church has become involved with volunteering at the State Street Shelter in Portland. It is a shelter that houses four families who are seeking asylum from December through the spring (six months). Along with other faith communities, we strive to spend time there so that the residents can sleep in safety. Most days they have to leave the shelter from morning till supper time, when the children go to school, and the adults find places to keep them warm.

Laura Lepine and I talked about ways we could help keep them warm as they walk around the city in the FMI: mimihinkel@gmail.com. Happy cold. Laura had already bought them hand warmers, which were greatly appreciated. Then we talked about applying to the Good Samaritan Fund (J & O Ministry) for funds to further this work. We applied and were granted \$400 to spend.


