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### PASTORAL NOTES

### **Cross Words**

...the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God...For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

### - 1 Corinthians 1 18, 22-25

To a community fractured, frantic, and turning on one another, the Apostle Paul wrote these words reminding them of how Christ crucified showed a way of inverting the everyday ways and stakes of struggles and conflict. That, actually, trying to conquer the other was the only way to really lose, and it was in freely giving all that Christ won for all.

On Ash Wednesday, March 5, Lent begins: the 40 days we follow Jesus's journey to Jerusalem, to betrayal and execution, to a cross, and to a stone rolled away from the tomb. In this season, I'm inviting us to spend our time reflecting on the cross. This, at one level, sounds pretty mundane: pastor asks church to think about cross; news at 11.

But an active and thoughtful theology of the cross may be essential living for us in these days. Because, if we misunderstand it, the cross can land us back in the midst of the very snares Christ's self-giving sought to free us from:

- A Jesus, as participant in cosmic judgment, who wouldn't want too much empathy or compassion for others... rather than one whose heart broke for all creation and stood in the breach to end our own self-judgement.
- A God who blesses might, violence, or the "justice" of execution... rather than one who sent a beloved son to highlight the actual path of life: radical vulnerability seeking reconciliation.

A Holy Spirit who might especially be upon the

one who accumulates and stores up resources and security... rather than flowing through the one who extravagantly gives all and so gives life.

Some of these distortions are all too present in our current cultural and religious landscape right now. We need the clarity of following Jesus on the Way of the cross: a way of holding hope in the midst of pain, of *kenosis* (self-emptying).

The way of the cross looks like failure. In fact, you could say that Christianity is about how to win by losing, how to let go creatively, how the only real ascent is descent. We need to be more concerned with following Jesus, which he told us to do numerous times, and less with worshipping Jesus—which he never once told us to do.1

Many of us may carry some images of the cross which ironically taught us to see it through a worshipful lens of judgment, death, and finality that Jesus's story has inverted and conquered, the story that we are asked to follow in his path.

At its best, the cross is more than a symbol to our faith. It is a framework for us of the intersections, tensions, and even paradoxes of our human lives that we must confront and find our place in if we are to live as transformed people: yes, of life and death, but also of pain and power, regret and reconciliation, judgment and grace, oppression and liberation.

So each week in Lent we'll reflect some on the complex tensions which Jesus's crucifixion and the cross ask us to hold if we would follow him, that we might gain the wisdom of foolishness and God's weakness that can help us hold strong to the promises of the resurrection even in trying and unsettling times. 

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


### ~ FCC Annual Service Project: Youth Socks & Underwear Collection

In February, work was completed on the purchasing and installation of a Café 36" Stainless Steel Pro Style Gas Range and new range hood with exhaust fan. Sized for large crowd preparation, it includes multi-ring and griddle zone burners, and a "Caterer's Oven" that fits a full-size catering pan with precision cooking modes and an accompanying temperature probe. Of note, it replaced the stove top/oven that was well over a half century old.

Bruce Kaake and Peter Cinelli more than proved themselves committed to FCC by the <u>incredible</u> number of man hours and expertise put into this project, starting with the search for the range, negotiating price and delivery, purchasing and self-installing the hood, and rewiring to accommodate the exhaust fan. 

### ~ Little Children of the World Update

The following email letter was recently received by FCC. The writer, Brittany Foster, President and CEO of Little Children of the World (Lo-oc) had most recently visited FCC, presenting the October 2024 Mission Moment.

"Last year, a local business in Dumaguete began the process of opening soup kitchens throughout the public schools in Dumaguete. This initiative includes Lo-oc where our feeding program that you have supported has been operating for many years. We are not territorial, and ultimately, our desire is that the most children possible be fed to have the best chance at getting an education. With this in mind, we see the other soup kitchens as partners with a similar mission and together we can feed more children. In response, we have opted to shift our feeding program location to another area that is not being served called Cadavinonan. This is to prevent duplication of services and to be sure the maximum number of children are being fed.

The school administrators in Cadavinonan cried when we approached them with the partnership because the needs of their students are great. Please know all the children receiving our feeding services in Lo-oc have continuity of services and are still receiving daily, healthy lunches. By shifting locations, we can feed more children in this new area that also have great need. Without you this would not be possible. Because of you, more hungry children will now have a healthy lunch and be able to better do their schoolwork. The administrators, teachers, and the children are so very grateful to have your love and support. Thank you for caring and giving to change these precious children's lives in Jesus' name. We are forever grateful for your faithful support, encouragement, and prayers. We look forward to many years of partnership serving Jesus together feeding hungry children. May God bless you as you continue to help LCW/LCP make a difference in this world."




