#### **PASTORAL NOTES**

#### Here I Raise My Ebenezer...

I have almost stopped endlessly talking about and delighting in the wedding of our friends Michael and Autumn at the end of April. I have joked, everywhere I go, I serve a community where I get to unite church members with strong opinions about the fact that there should be a hymn at a wedding, and that we should be sure to get the hymn from the *right* hymnal so the first part of the second verse of *Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing* reads:

Here I raise my ebenezer, hither by thy help I'm come. And I hope, by thy good pleasure, safely to arrive at home.

In many hymnals, that phrase has been adapted because, the thinking goes, nobody remembers what an *ebenezer* is anymore. Even my spell check doesn't recognize it as a word. (Though it does as a name... well played, Mr. Dickens.) An Ebenezer was a memorial—sometimes a rock set vertically as a pillar, sometimes a pile of rocks, closer to the Celtic *cairn*—to memorialize an important inflection point in a journey. (Think the people of Israel crossing the Jordan.)

This is *sort of* a "milestone" ... but something more. At a wedding, yes, we know there is a road ahead, but maybe the call is more than simply a point along the loving path of two of our good friends on their happy day. A milestone might be about where they are going next... but maybe an ebenezer is more a lasting memorial of where they come from on a more mysterious path.

It's a time of milestones. The church year and seasons change and mark another cycle of new life. We have celebrated and will celebrate baptisms, graduations, marriages, have had transitions in leadership, and more. Many have also tenderly marked the passages of illness and death in some cases, and others have marked painful turning points of loss or change they did not seek.

Milestones can lead us into the trap of always wanting to be certain of the next leg of the journey... to view each fixed point as a one vanishing behind us as we look to the next marker: A clear path that is surely and straightforwardly leading us to a destination that we are convinced we are the ones navigating towards. We live in a culture

that tends to value efficiency and forward momentum in a straight line. If we are well... well, surely things could be better. If we are challenged, then onward and upward is the only direction... take the express train. Experiences of rest and rejoicing right where we are need not apply. Even more, feeling uncertain or lost is often portrayed as a personal failing.

Of course, this is very different from every spiritual journey reported in our scriptures: if you map out Jesus's trail as he preaches and teaches, or Paul's journey of evangelism, or certainly that Exodus journey through the wilderness, you will not find a lot of straight lines! All the scriptural examples of the way and life of faith find people weaving through complexity and uncertainty: doubling back and taking the long road, pausing, reorienting, wandering and wondering on unknown paths.

Singing our old hymn with a congregation I'm reminded that ebenezers are meant to simply mark and wonder in what's in the rearview... and remember these things as testimony that *God accompanies us into an altogether uncertain future*. At a wedding, we celebrate what God in love has *already done* in calling two people to share promises... promises which will keep them in mutual care in a future totally unknown to them. At a graduation we celebrate accomplishments of what has been, not some dreamed of vision of success we insist our loved ones meet next. On the edge of a time of challenge we may even celebrate that we have come this far by faith, and not that faith promises an easy and direct route to the "finish line!"

A wise counselor once challenged me that if my gaze was always on a point just over the horizon, I'd be unlikely to enjoy any of the view along the way, and might even trip over my own feet... or worse. As this summer comes, I hope you will, as I do a little more often now, pause to give thanks: for where you have been and are now... where we as a community of faith have been and are now... for "hither by [God's] help we've come." There is, in this season, a gentle rest to know that God has been with us, and will guide us still... May we find that, wherever we are on this journey, we have in God already, "safely arrived at home."

## Spring Book Study Group Brings Together Community, Church Participants To Discuss Vital Climate Work

What If We Get It Right? For four Wednesday evenings in April and May, community and church participants gathered in Fellowship Hall to consider this question and some of the many positive visions for resolving our world's climate crisis described in Dr. Ayana Elizabeth Johnson's 2024 book of the same title.

The book is a series of interviews with leading scientists, economists, philanthropists, land and ocean farmers and others engaged in building resilient communities, renewable energy systems and social and environmental justice. It has been described as an "opportunity to eavesdrop on intimate conversations with the world's most brilliant change-makers."

More than two dozen participants registered for the series, contributing to robust conversations. Half of those attending were new to Foreside Community Church and contemporary reimagining of the learned of the program thanks to the BTS Center's help in promoting the program.

The Green Team sponsored 4-night book series "What If ... " attracted good participation. The committee looks forward to future presentations on timely and important topics.



We will hear from Dr. John Zavodny who joined the Maine Seacoast Mission in 2019, for providing the means and opportunities through which after a 20-year career as a Professor of Philosophy, most members can become directly involved in work on behalf recently at Unity College. Dr. Zavodny is from Cleveland, of those in need in our communities. In addition to spon-Ohio, and a proud graduate of the University of Tennessee, Knoxville.

Maine Seacoast Mission first took on its "task of greater magnitude" when two Mount Desert Island pastors and brothers, Alexander and Angus MacDonald, sailed a small sloop called *Hope* to islands and lighthouses along the unteers who are moved to be "part of the solution." If this Maine coast, intent on relieving the desolate conditions they often found there. As a pastor in Bar Harbor, Angus was connected to many of the wealthy rusticators of Mount Desert Island. He successfully solicited their help in funding the *Hope* and its charitable endeavors, and the Maine Seacoast Mission was born in 1905. From the start, the Mission provided access to medical and dental care, spiritual support, education, and crisis services.
