As we move into the Easter season, I find myself in a few groups reading together. Alongside our Green Team and the BTS Center, I'm reading What Jürgen Moltmann: If We Get It Right: A Vision of Climate Futures by Ayana Elizabeth Johnson. With some Cumberland Association clergy colleagues, I am reading Life After Doom: Wisdom and Courage for a World Falling Apart by Brian McLaren. Both address the realities of changing climate, our role in those changes, what may be asked of us to adapt in the face of them, and seek to help equip people and stir them to do what they can hopeful and—well, less hopeful circumstances.

What If We Get it Right?...or... Life After Doom... ty intense ambiguity about hope.

That may be on theme for Easter, though. I think of the strange paralysis of the disciples after the resurrection, even as they slowly came to understand more of what the risen Christ would mean for them, and for the world: they're found locked away in upper rooms in fear, or returning to their first careers as fisher-folk. For a season, the would-be apostles seem convinced of Christ's resurrection, and doubtful that resurrection might ask or call them into any response... Christ is risen! (exclamation point) and Will we rise and follow him? (question mark)

There is a lot that feels precarious in the world

and in our lives on any given day, ecologically or otherwise. There is much that feels too large for any one

I'm thankful for these disciples' resurrection Rev. Dr. Allen Ewing-Merrill often reminds faith communities seeking greater care for the earth to face this challenge, in the words of the theologian

'If we knew with certainty that we would not survive, we would do nothing. If we knew with certainty that we would survive, we would also do nothing. Only if the future is open for both possibilities are we forced to do today what is necessary to survive tomorrow."1

Easter's disciples are called by a risen Christ to follow on an extraordinary yet uncertain way. Just so, we're called to respond and follow on that Way of love in trying times... not because we are certain of any destination, but certain of our dedication to live as Christ's beloved and loving community, no matter the titles alone are enough to leave one in some pret- the outcome. In a meditation on hope that might be deeper than some envisioned perfect result, Brian McLaren offers:

> When our prime motive is love, a different logic comes into play. We find courage and confidence, not in the likelihood of a good outcome, but in our commitment to love. Love may or may not provide a way through to a solution to our predicament, but it will provide a way forward in our predicament, one step into the unknown at a time. Sustained by this fierce love...we may persevere long enough that, to our surprise, a new way may appear where there had been no way. 2

Christ has gone ahead of us. Even in the midst of great uncertainty, then, we follow Christ forward in love. The destination may be unclear, but the Way is bright and unfolding before us, and we can trust that a life on that path of love for God, for one another, and for this fragile creation will never really end... but be transformed, and rise.


Soon there will be a chart with all of the details downstairs where the sign up was; but first I need to reach out to each of the hosts and drivers individually to be sure they are all on board.

Vincent Van Gogh, even with his mental illness, poverty, isolation,



Cox writes about her own experiences: weeks spent living in a homeless shelter in New York City, a trip to the Mid-East where she visited Yasser Arafat in his compound, an unexpectedly impacting Alaskan adventure, working with abused/neglected children, and the explorations of the mind through reading. READ-ING VAN GOGH plunges into the ideas of psychologists, artists, poets, physicists, and fiction writers who combine reason, imagination, and experience in a way that might enlarge the definitions we live by.

For in every corner of every room were phantoms of a time dead but not forgotten-a past devotedly preserved by the sinister

housekeeper, Mrs. Danvers: a suite immaculate and untouched, clothing laid out and ready to be worn, but not by any of the great house's current occupants. With an eerie presentiment of evil tightening her heart, the second Mrs. De Winter walked in the shadow of her mysterious predecessor, determined to uncover the darkest secrets and shattering truths about Maxim's first wife-the late and hauntingly beautiful Rebecca." Three members of the FCC Green Team attended the annual Maine Conservation Lobby Day in Augusta on April 3. The event is hosted by the Maine Conservation Alli-

ance and provides Maine citizens with the resources needed to meet and speak with their representatives of the House and Senate about specific legislative initiatives. Over 50 people from around the state met in a conference room where staff provided fact sheets on the four specific initiatives - increasing storm preparedness for Maine communities, making climate polluters pay (specifically oil and gas companies), an energy fairness act, and preventing future toxic spills of PFAS chemicals. We were instructed on how to approach and speak with our representatives, introduce one of the initiatives, and specifically ask for their support. After this preparation, we walked up to the State House. Lobbying activity took place in the third floor hallways where the Senate and Legislative chambers are located. Staff stone mansion on the wind-leaders assisted us in locating our representatives as they headed from meetings to their sessions, and everyone was successful in having at least one five-minute conversation.

> We were told that our representatives genuinely welcome members of the general public to meet them at the State House so they can hear our opinions and requests. This experience was invaluable in showing us how we can influence the legislative process by the most direct way possible – in person.


