## PASTORAL NOTES

### Where Christ is Found

I am, as ever, thankful for the chance to worship and walk through the mysteries and traditions of Holy Week as we enter April this year. I hope that you'll feel welcome to come experience the fullness of that pattern we trace each year: from the loud Hosanna's of Palm Sunday to the sorrow of the tomb on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, to the explosion of color, music, and joy that come in celebration of Christ's resurrection.

In the wake of Easter morning, I will and always do give thanks for all the loud shouts of *Alleluia* and "Christ is risen indeed!" But I will admit that it is easy to go from those highs to the cynical baseline of our everyday world. We long for new life but find deadly patterns of war and alienation too consistently in our minds and lives.

So, I always find great comfort in the quieter Easter story of two disciples walking the road to Emmaus, still afraid in the wake of Jesus's death and uncertain of the strange rumors that they have heard when they encounter the risen Jesus but do not recognize him... for a time...

*[The two disciples] urged him strongly, saying, 'Stay with us, because it is almost evening and the day is now nearly over.' So he went in to stay with them. When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognized him; and he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?' – Luke 24:29-32*

The way in which Luke confirms Christ is risen on Easter Day is not through visions of angels, trumpet blasts, and earthquakes. It is through companionship on the way and the sharing of a simple meal. This story is the fulfillment of the story of the Last Supper, the proof that what Jesus has said has indeed come to pass: where he is remembered in broken bread and a cup shared, Christ will be present

and known... and his love will warm our hearts that often run cool.

If you spend the rest of this month in the dazzling wonder of Easter Alleluias, I say, bless you! But, please, if you struggle to find that radiance, do not despair or count yourself out. One of our great preachers, Barbara Brown Taylor, once wrote of the Emmaus story,

*The blindness of the two disciples does not keep their Christ from coming to them. He does not limit his post-resurrection appearances to those with full confidence in him. He comes to the disappointed, the doubtful, the disconsolate. He comes to those who do not know their Bible, who do not recognize him even when they are walking right beside him. He comes to those who have given up and headed back home" (Barbara Brown Taylor, *Gospel Medicine*, p. 23)*

Trust that you are welcomed to this good news, however it comes to you: bright and brash, or slowly and subtly. And beyond Easter Day, I give thanks for living in beloved community with you all, for I am blessed to know that Christ is risen in ways that seem everyday. When:

- Teenagers delicately place Easter eggs in the cemetery by the quiet cool of Easter morning for our youngest members to find.
  - As knitters weave care into prayers shawls, but also into caring conversation for each other and those they knit for.
  - As friends make the blessing of hospitality real in the joyful breaking of bread (or cookies) at coffee hour.
  - As Men and Women's breakfasts find the warmth of conversation that can only come right on the edge of eating with your mouth full.
- When you visit one another in times when the path ahead seems uncertain, and offer listening and wondering companionship.

I would invite you in the *Season* of Easter to come to ponder the quiet, small ways in which resurrection reveals itself in the life of this church, and in your own life... where bread is broken, and friendship shared.

Christ is risen, indeed.

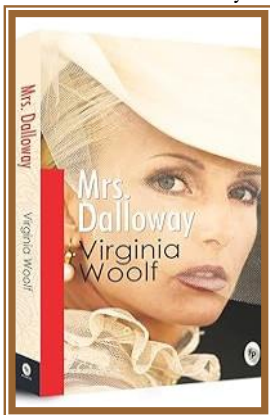

**FCC Book Club Updates**

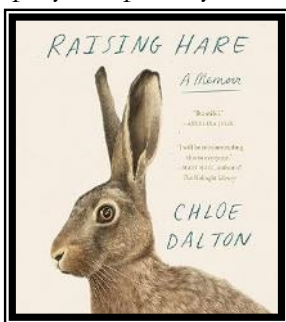
For our March meeting, the FCC book club spent a fun hour discussing the humor, the quirky characters of Borg, and the importance of community in Britt-Marie Was Here by Fredrik Backman. Our next selection for April 15 is the classic Mrs. Dalloway by Virginia Woolf.

“Mrs. Dalloway is a 1925 novel by Virginia Woolf that follows a day in the life of Clarissa Dalloway, a high-society woman in post-World War I London as she prepares for a party. Using stream-of-consciousness, the novel delves into her mind, exploring her past, choices, and the social structure of the time, while also interweaving the story of Septimus Smith, a shell-shocked veteran whose life tragically intersects with hers. It's a landmark of modernist literature, known for its psychological depth and exploration of themes like mental illness, feminism, and the nature of consciousness.” (quoted from Google)



For those of you who would like to look ahead we will be discussing Raising Hare: A Memoir by Chloe Dalton on May 20.

“A moving and fascinating meditation on freedom, trust, loss, and our relationship with the natural world, explored through the story of one woman’s unlikely friendship with a wild hare. In February 2021, Dalton stumbles upon a newborn hare—a leveret—that had been chased by a dog. Fearing for its life, she brings it home, only to discover how impossible it is to rear a wild hare, most of whom perish in captivity from either shock or starvation. Through trial and error, she learns to feed and care for the leveret with every intention of returning it to the wilderness. Instead, it becomes her constant companion, wandering the fields and woods at night and returning to Dalton’s house by day. Though Dalton feared that the hare would be preyed upon by foxes, stoats, feral cats, raptors, and even people, she never tried to restrict it to the house. Each time the hare leaves, Chloe knows she may never see it again. Yet she also understands that to confine it would be its own kind of death. Raising Hare chronicles their journey together, while also taking a deep dive into the lives and nature of hares, and the



way they have been viewed historically in art, literature, and folklore. We witness first-hand the joy at this extraordinary relationship between human and animal, which serves as a reminder that the best things, and most beautiful experiences, arise when we least expect them.” (quoted from Goodreads)

We suggest getting on a library list for this book now because it has become tremendously popular and won multiple awards. We hope to encourage members of the green team or anyone at all interested in right relationships with the natural world to join us for this special discussion to be held in the upstairs classroom of the church on Wednesday, May 20.
