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## PASTORAL NOTES

### On the Way

*[God spoke to Moses:] "I will take you as my people, and I will be your God. You shall know that I am the Lord your God, who has freed you from the burdens of the Egyptians." Exodus 6:7*

These words of covenant from God launch a whole heroic narrative arc, a 40-year road trip, complete with detours, and the formation of a new communal identity for the people of Israel: both through how they shape themselves as a people, and how they are shaped by the land they travel through and inhabit.

But it begins by God simply stating who God will be, and who the people of God will be... to each other. In the moment it seems simplistic, short shrift for the enormity of what will follow... but it is the beginning of transformation. Covenant will do that.

I've been busy this summer with a beloved part of my work: supporting couples as they make covenant promises of marriage to one another. It is joyful and awe-inspiring to watch people make faithful promises to accompany, bear witness to, and change with another. They make those promises on a day of celebration, but they *keep* them in all sorts of days to come: some good, some bad, some they could never imagine at the start.

In church's beloved community God also shapes us through commitments and promises we make to one another, trusting in God's grace and Spirit moving between us through the years. This is true for those who worship with us, who take the further step to covenant membership, and those who take on ministry, leadership, and even staff positions in the church's life.

10 years ago, our congregation tried an experiment in our worship life and ministry. Our Minister of Music role, long occupied by a single full-time choir director and organist, would instead be filled by a team. We were blessed to call Trevor Lavenbein and David Bartoletti to share in this ministry together. They knew each other very little, but arrived with energy and openness. The resulting relationship has been more than we could have imagined: bringing creativity, joy, meaning, and music.

Musical partnership, like most any partnership, takes a lot of listening: listening for how the other is developing or adapting a theme not just pitch or timing, but its timbre and color. Knowing when to sup-

port and when to take the lead. It is a gift to be in service with Trevor and David, to witness how they listen to each other, to the voice and music of our congregation, and to their own gifts as they live into and develop them. It is even more a gift to watch how they—and we—are transformed by our connection and ministry together. On **Sunday, September 13th**, all are welcome to gather to sing and celebrate 10 years of ministry together, and more to come!

This fall, David will be completing his Bachelor's in Music degree from the University of Maine in Augusta, undertaken in the last years as a deepening and widening of his musical talents. I would share David's invitation to you to attend his Capstone Recital, tentatively titled *Debussy et Amis* (Debussy and Friends) on **September 27th at 3pm at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Brunswick**. It's a gift to celebrate each other's accomplishments!

In the same way, this fall, we continue to give thanks for all the gifts of Christina Sklarz's work with our congregation as Office Manager through the last almost 13 years as she prepares for retirement at the end of this year. When she first came to the church, Christina inherited the role of Parish Administrator with the office as our hub of communications and connection. In her service, Christina has expanded her Office Manager role to include the bookkeeping and financial reporting of the church, management of many aspects of everyday maintenance for buildings and supplies, and more. Years ago, Christina also made the faith-filled decision to become a member of our congregation, a role she will more fully live into in the time to come as we celebrate all she has done, and bless all that she will do as she passes this milestone.

Allowing for this change with Christina's ministry, then, also prepares us to welcome new faces and gifts into our mutual life and ministry. You can read on to learn more about our newest staff member, Kate Hollinger, who will be transitioning into our bookkeeper role throughout the autumn months.

The cycle continues: we welcome, make promises together, and are transformed by the work of living into those promises with love. Thanks be to God for the ways in which faithful people are called into connection, community, and service in this congregation.

We're delighted to announce that we have hired Lyndsay Hollinger (who goes by her middle name, Kate) to be our Bookkeeper. ### Green Team Retreat Report

The Green Team met for a retreat on Saturday, August 21. It was hosted by Dana Humphreys at the beautiful Homewood Community Lodge and facilitated by Sue Clark and Kathie McCatherin.

The team reviewed the *Seeking Right Relationship with the Earth Covenant Statement* that was approved by the congregation in May 2026. We utilized data from congregational feedback that we obtained during the covenant discernment process to identify themes and topics that would appeal to and meet the needs of our congregation for the coming 2026-27 church year. Based on research through the Bangor Theological Seminary and the work already done by our Green Team, three main areas for action emerged- Community Building, Grounds and Facilities, and Spiritual Practices/Rituals. From these broad categories our team participated in a thoughtful process to identify projects and events that would both speak to the needs/interests of our congregation and were seen as realistic and doable for our community. Stay tuned! You will be hearing more about the following:

An ongoing monthly series that will highlight practical guidance on specific practices and actions we can take in our daily lives to reduce our environmental impact on the earth.

Ways we can continue to “green” our grounds and facility.

A series of learnings and events related to the Wabanaki Peoples who were the original inhabitants of the geographic area we dwell in- their history, culture, spirituality, practices and current issues affecting them.

Worshipping in Nature- this might include ritual, spiritual themes, music etc.

We acknowledge that meeting and honoring our *Seeking Right Relationship with the Earth Covenant* is a church community-wide endeavor. We will be reaching out to committees and individuals for involvement and engagement.

### ***Justice & Outreach Ministry and Nanna's House***

Imagine that you are a minor child and within minutes of a home crisis you are rushed from your home by adults that you have never met. You have none of your comfort items- often you have only the clothes you are wearing. This is only the beginning of days, weeks, and possibly much, much longer of confusion and disorientation. You are at the beginning of entering the Foster Care program.

All of us hope that government agencies will quickly be able to provide safety and comfort for these children. But as Beth Fournier, the heart of Nanna's House can tell you, government agencies and case workers are overwhelmed and shorthanded. Nanna's House is dedicated to easing the transition into Foster Care for children and families. When an infant arrives at a temporary home with nothing but a diaper, Nanna's House is ready to provide essential clothing and supplies and even a comfort stuffy or blanket. When an adolescent finds themselves in a totally new environment and does not have a change of clothes or even a toothbrush, caseworkers are able to physically access what is needed at Nanna's House.

If anyone would like to learn about a very special grassroots charity for our most vulnerable neighbors, you are invited to hear Beth Fournier at FCC Mission Moment on Sunday Service on September 27. Beth's education as an occupational therapist allows her to have an exceptional understanding of what children need. Her experience as a mother of her two biological children and her two adopted children from the foster care program, reflects her deep love of all young people. And her design of Nanna's House speaks of her ability to understand how to positively impact the lives of children going through hard times.

The Ministry of Justice & Outreach is asking our congregation to help Nanna's House provide essential supplies for these children. Please consider donating the following items to our collection bins:

**Travel size toiletries:** Shampoo, Toothbrushes, Toothpaste, Chapstick, Deodorant, Combs, Small soaps/body wash, Mini travel hair brushes; small packs of women's sanitary items.

**Underwear, socks, and Pajamas:** For all ages and genders- large sizes are especially needed.

### *Do Handbells Sound Different in Scotland?*

In August, I had the wonderful opportunity to find out! I attended the 22<sup>nd</sup> International Handbell Symposium in Aberdeen as part of a 16-member ensemble representing New England. Over 600 ringers representing 14 countries spent five days in Aberdeen's P&J Convention Center, rehearsing eleven arrangements in preparation for a concert on Saturday afternoon. The music was chosen by worldwide handbell guilds – Korea, Hong Kong, Canada, Singapore, Great Britain, Japan, the United States, and Australasia. Each arrangement was directed by a different conductor. And while handbells speak the same language, the ringers certainly didn't. A large number of attendees were from Asia where handbells are very popular. Therefore, during rehearsals, the instructions from each conductor needed to be translated into an Asian language. (Sadly, I never found out which Asian language was spoken). One piece was conducted by Mihyun Kim of Korea, so translation from Korean to English was provided.

### Handbells Sound (cont.)

And ringers represented all ages. There were several pre-teens, including the delightful Eunice (born in Hong Kong but living in New Zealand and who I believe met every single ringer there!), many teens and twenties ringers, up to a few dedicated "elderlies," including one older woman who played with great passion from her wheelchair. Each night of the convention, many solo ensembles were performed for the attendees. The New England ensemble, named Randomly Bronze New England, played a piece titled, "Let Tyrants Shake Their Iron Rod," a contemporary arrangement of the 1770 revolutionary war hymn written by William Billings. The group gathered four times in the late spring and early summer to rehearse our piece as well as the other symposium music. It was a very difficult piece with a musical equivalent of the chaos of war, but we pulled it off triumphantly!

My ringing/traveling partner, Amy, who lives in Lincolnville, and I also managed to snag some tourist time in Dublin, Aberdeen, Inverness and the Isle of Skye during and after the convention. And, yes I did try both haggis and black pudding. I'll leave it at the "try"... and happy to return to my mac & cheese comfort food.

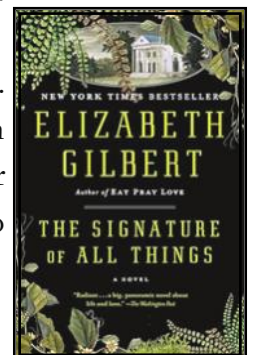
